GENERAL AND SHEA

GET BONNEVILLE JOB

The General Construction company and J. F. Shea company, Inc., of Portland, with a joint bid of \$3,895,592, submitted the low proposal for the navigation lock and powerhouse substructure masonry work at Bonneville dam when bids were opened in Portland Monday.

This is the second largest job on the \$31,000,000 power and navigation project to be advertised to date, the largest being the main spillway dam which was awarded recently. Approximately 500 men will be employed on the masonry work.

Bids submitted were considered exceptionally close. The Columbia Construction company, Portland, submitted a proposal of \$3,927,755.75.

The General Construction Company built Owyhee dam and is completing a tunnel job near Nyssa at present. The Shea company built one of the large diversion tunnels on the Owyhee project two years ago.
