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RECLAMATION IS SAFEGUARD

The drouth of this year is putting reclamation in a new light for the existence of such projects as Owyhee and Vale is going to save a general agricultural collapse. These were the words of Dr. Elwood Mead when he reached Portland Friday after his annual tour of western projects.

Accounted the world's greatest expert in reclamation, having studied it in other countries and in charge of the national bureau since 1924, praise coming from Dr. Mead is welcomed here. He cited the Owyhee and Vale as the finest examples of reclamation that can be found in this country. These two projects will have plenty of water, he said.

Dr. Mead took particular notice of hay, implying that during the coming year the man having hayseed in his hair is apt to be the lucky one. He believes there will be a great demand for feed in the drouth-stricken middlewest in which event prices here will be elevated to a good figure.
