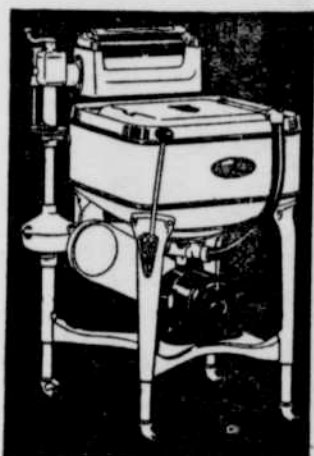

BOISE WILL STAGE CENTENNIAL SHOW SEPTEMBER 13, 14, 15

Boise—One hundred years of development and progress which have seen the transformation of Idaho from a ragged unknown, feared wilderness to a happy thriving state populated by energetic loyal people, will be appropriately observed by the Fort Boise Centennial celebration which will be held in Boise, September 13, 14, 15.

The occasion of the observance will be the honoring of the centennial anniversary of the establishment of the first permanent settlements by white men in what is now Idaho. Old Fort Boise was built in 1834 by Thomas McKay, one of Hudson's Bay Company's most trusted leaders, and served for several years as the headquarters of those hardy trappers who dared the wilderness in their venturesome quests for fur.

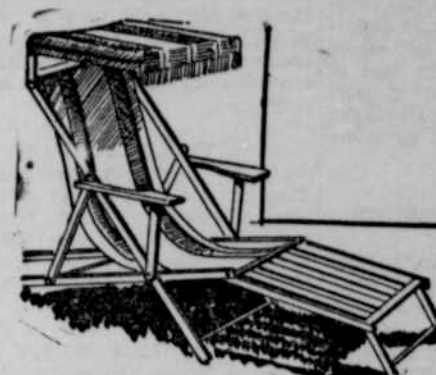
NYSSA COMMUNITY CHURCH
