## HORSE DISEASE FOUND IN COUNTY

Equine encephalomyelitis, commonly called "brain fever" in horses has made its appearance in Malheur County. As yet the spread is not general but there is every prospect that if hot weather continues, the infection may become general.

According to County Agent Larson the infection is apparently spread by irrigation water or mosquitoes and flies. Usually the first indication of this disease is a stiffness followed by a rise in temperature. Frequently the throat muscles are paralyzed. Owners who have horses may be protected by watering out of a well and not permitting them to assemble with other horses. The spread of the infection may also be prevented by isolating a sick horse and keeping him in a dark stable away from mosquitoes and flies. Records show that about two-thirds of the cases recover where careful treatment is given.

Treatment has been most effective where the animal has been kept in a cool dark place such as potato cellars. By spraying water over the animal and on the side walls of the barn, the temperature may be kept down and the excessive loss of water from the system avoided. Good nursing is important.
