300 GRANGERS AT BIG PICNIC HEAR PIERCE AND GILL

3 PER CENT MONEY AND CHEAP POWER STRESSED BY PIERCE; GILL HITS SALE TAX, PARTISANISM.

Unity—(Special to The Journal)—A long table high with an abundance of good food (chocolate cake and fried chicken predominating), group after group of farmers and children out for a holiday, and a sprinkling of grange brethren, candidates in the coming election, was the scene on East Camp creek, about nine miles from Unity, where the sixth annual tri-county grange picnic was held Sunday. In the gathering of more than 300 were representatives from Grant, Baker and Malheur counties, besides visitors from various other sections.

Representative Walter M. Pierce, democratic candidate to again represent the second district in congress was honor guest and speaker for the third successive year.

High Interest Blamed
High interest rates and fixed dividends are largely responsible for our breakdown, especially in agriculture, Mr. Pierce said.

"I believe money could be loaned to farmers for three per cent," he declared, "and such loans should be made direct from the government through a concentrated county board. Each loan should be individual."

"The government under President Roosevelt is investing \$100,000,000 at Bonneville to develop power that will make the northwest a manufacturing center, but the big fight will be to prevent the president from developing Bonneville for the benefit of the people."

"I believe brighter days are ahead when there will be more money, higher prices for products and lower interest rates," the speaker said in closing.

Ray Gill, state grange master and republican candidate for state senator traced the political and governmental trend in Germany, Italy and Russia.

"With our many unemployed I think we are too secure in our belief that our government is in no danger," he said.

"The battle is no longer for political and religious freedom, but for economic freedom. Industrial centers control finances and the struggle is now between agriculture and industry. We have been told the depression was a result of the war, and it is true that the war led up to our condition, but equally serious is the fact that 80 per cent of the wealth is in the hands of four per cent of the people. Until we have a breakdown of this system and distribute the wealth of the nation we won't have prosperity. This can be accomplished through the income tax, inheritance and gift taxes."

"Another danger to our survival is that too many people have lost that old fighting spirit typical of our pioneers. Only 40 per cent of the registered voters voted at the last election. What does it avail the farmer to stay home and produce an extra sack of potatoes if he has no sale for his product?"

"Our agricultural class must be ready and organized to know the problems that are coming. The sales tax is another method of spreading the tax responsibility upon the masses. In Illinois this tax has lifted two and one-half billion dollars in taxes off the utilities. If the people do not rise and meet the threat of these conditions I do not see any difference between the form of government set up by Hitler and big business than that of communists who tear down the government."

"We must break blind partisanship and work for the welfare of the masses of people. We must go to the ballot box understanding men and measures, our problems must not be settled by blood shed but by intelligent voting."

Officers Re-elected
J. Edwin Johnson of Vale, chairman of the tri-county picnic, was re-elected as were George Yaskum of Grant county and T. C. Deeringer of Baker county.

Mrs. Karl Norvall, pomona grange lecturer of Malheur county had charge of the program, and minutes of the 1933 meeting were read by Esther Reed, Hereford grange lecturer. Mrs. Stevenson accompanied group singing, which opened the program.

The balance of the program included stunts by birthday groups led by Mrs. Norvall, Esther Reed, Mrs. C. A. Ketcham and Mrs. Earl Lofton.
