INVESTING IN BETTER LIVING

To buy a modern home, small or large, expensive or inexpensive, is to make an investment in better living.

Construction has stood still the past few years, ever since it tumbled down with the depression, but contractors, designers, builders, and equipment manufacturers have continued to improve their services and commodities.

They have given us not only more comfortable, but more efficient homes—homes in which four or five rooms do the work that six rooms used to do. They have given us

new ideas of heating, ventilation, air-conditioning, furnishing, designing.

They have given us mechanical equipment which can be adequately described only by the word "marvelous"—equipment which is more-than-human in doing work inexpensively and quickly, that used to take back-breaking hours before a furnace or over a washboard.

And, to cap the climax, building costs are still well below normal levels. There are plenty of skilled and unskilled workmen. When we build we give men jobs and not only get a bargain for ourselves, but advance recovery by stimulating purchasing power and industrial production.

There are few better slogans than "Build Now—Repair Now!"

FAIR FOOD PRICES

Drought in America has turned the problem of preventing high prices on shortened food supplies. President Roosevelt has just added his declaration to that of lesser members of the Administration that the force of the Government will be used to suppress any attempts at profiteering in agricultural commodities.

Actually if reliance can be put upon Department of Agriculture figures—and they have shown themselves fairly immune from political tampering—the United States is far from any occasion for famine prices. With carry-overs of more than a year's supply in most of the leading farm products, even the amazingly reduced yields this year will occasion no actual shortage. There will be achieved approximately the balance at which the agricultural program has aimed—sufficiency without excess of supply. If this leads to farm prices more nearly proportionate to industrial prices, the cities cannot well complain of injustice.

But food prices should certainly go no higher than a fair compensation to the producer requires. To prevent needless price boosting, the Government's best weapon is information. Simply the issuance of dependable figures on supplies of wheat, cotton, corn, and so forth, counteracts the scares of scarcity. And to analyze how small a fraction an increase of the farm price actually adds to a finished product is often to discountenance the price a middleman asks on that pretext. In this emergency the best way to circumvent the profiteer is to give the consumer the facts.

SHIRLEY POINTS THE WAY

Shirley Temple, aged 6, is the latest screen sensation. She is "packing 'em in" throughout the country and drawing down the modest stipend of \$1250 a week for her entertainment efforts. Incidentally Shirley doesn't have to rely on sex appeal, double meaning wisecracks, lack of clothes or anything in the nature that cynical Hollywood producers had come to regard as essential to profits. She appeals to the highest instincts of humanity, the love for children. Her "drama" is as natural and unspoiled as a wild flower.

And the people, who Hollywood supposed to want only sexy stuff pack in to see her, just as they do for Will Rogers' always clean films, "Little Women" and others that achieved real dramatic quality without questionable scenes or dialogue. Entertainment need not be dull because it is clean. It does need to be entertaining and if producers can't achieve that they sometimes secure audiences by off-color stuff, just as an individual who isn't healthy can stop headache with a shot of dope.

The real solution of the picture industry's problem is to improve the quality of its offerings and the recent success of certain high grade pictures clearly points the way. A little child can lead them.—Baker Democrat-Herald.

Canned Tomato Juice

1 apple box ripe tomatoes
1 stalk celery.
4 large onions
2 large seeded Green Peppers
2 cloves garlic

Chop above ingredients together and simmer in preserving kettle for 2 hours.

Strain through coarse sieve, add juice of 2 lemons, ¼ cup salt, 1 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup sugar. Heat to boiling point and add pinch soda.

Be sure bottles are sterilized and fill one at a time—capping each bottle as it is filled. The immediate capping insures keeping quality of juice. For cocktails, chili sauce, catsup or tabasco sauce may be added. The sugar and garlic give the fine flavor.
