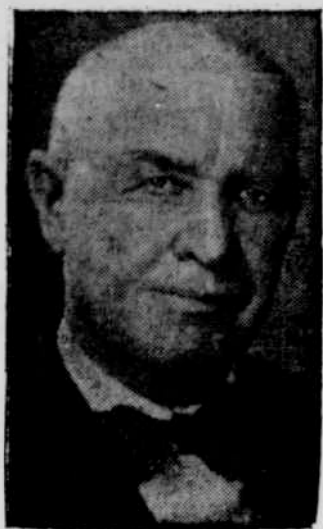


# Re-Elect Walter M. PIERCE

## Congressman 2nd District



Power and Sales Tax will be outstanding issue in the next Congress.

Mr. Pierce has an opponent who voted to give all the water power of Oregon to the Power Companies forever. He also supported the Sales Tax.

Mr. Pierce never voted for the power trust.

He never voted to exempt riches from taxation.

He never voted against labor.

He never voted against the farmer.

He never voted for a Sales Tax.

For 15 years he has advocated unemployment insurance and old age pensions.

### FOR THE VETERAN

Congressman Pierce assisted Congressman Patman, of Texas, in bringing his bill for payment of adjusted compensation certificates to the floor and cast his vote in favor of it. This bill called for the payment of the bonus in currency issued against the Government Reserve. This bill would save both the veteran and the government money.

He supported the Taber Amendments which restored to the veterans many of the benefits they had lost.

He voted for the Rankin Widow's and Orphan's bill.

As State Senator he secured passage of the first soldier's education bill.

As Governor he signed a bill permitting Spanish-American War Veterans to borrow from the Veterans' State Aid Commission.

Also, as Governor, he helped to adminis-

ter the Veterans' State Aid fund.

He favors the conscription of wealth and resources in event of war. He is unalterably opposed to profit in warfare.

### FOR LABOR

In his message as Governor, in 1927, he recommended an Old Age Pension law for Oregon, and was its first public advocate in this State. As State Senator, in 1919, he introduced a resolution for a constitutional amendment guaranteeing employment. His support of these social insurance measures, to put a stop to the scrapping of men and women has been a matter of public record for years. It will be continued in Congress.

In Congress, his record for labor was so satisfactory that he received many voluntary endorsements from Brotherhoods and other organizations which had many representatives in Washington, watching their interests. Among his most helpful acts for labor was the signing of the "round table" which forced the Railroad Pension Bill to passage, as a forerunner of a general system of Old Age Pensions; his signing the petition to force action on the six hour day bill to increase employment, his vote for the Railway Labor Amendments, and his enthusiastic support of the CCC Camps for the salvation of the unemployed young men and the support of their dependents.

He was behind the administration in every effort to relieve hunger, want, and unemployment, and put the relief money into the hands of the worker instead of into subsidies for big business.

### A COMPARISON

Between the Records of Mr. Pierce and Mr. Upton:

#### MR. PIERCE

1. SALES TAX—Mr. Pierce has always opposed a Sales tax. He made many speeches against it when referred to the people of Oregon.

2. POWER—Mr. Pierce has been a champion of the people's rights as opposed to the monopolistic control of water power by the power interests. He has favored the Orange Power bill as the "Big Stick Behind the door" to assure Oregon people the benefits of Bonneville power.

3. IRRIGATION—Mr. Pierce has always advocated and voted for the interests of irrigation. There are several projects under development in Eastern Oregon today due to his efforts. He supported refinancing of districts with R. F. C. Several in Eastern Oregon have already taken advantage of the opportunity.

4. ECONOMY—One of the first measures favored by Mr. Pierce in the special session was one which reduced his own salary \$1500. Not all of this amount has yet been restored. As Governor he stopped the huge Paving Bonds.

5. ADMINISTRATION SUPPORT—He was the only congressman from the Pacific Northwest to give 100 per cent support in the special session. He has been in strict accord with the administration measures.

6. OLEO—Introduced and had passed first Oleo bill in interest of dairymen in Oregon. He now has Oleo bill in congress which will come up for consideration at the next session of congress.

7. VETERANS—Mr. Pierce, as Governor signed the bill which Mr. Upton claims credit for. He has supported the cause of the Veterans without thought of sharing in the benefits of the legislation.

8. ABILITY—This entire circular attests to Mr. Pierce's vigor and ability in caring for the interest of Eastern Oregon. Below are the remarks of Administration leaders and friends praising his ability.

Walter M. Pierce never voted for the Power Trust. He never voted to exempt rich from taxation. He never voted against Labor. He never voted against the farmer. He never voted to exploit settlers in the name of irrigation.

He never voted to reduce income and inheritance taxes. He never betrayed the dairymen by supporting the Oleo manufacturers.
