BURTON LOSES RAILROAD CASE

Salem, Nov. 27—Seniority rights of telegraphers over which a controversy has waged since the consolidation of two divisions of the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company in eastern Oregon, was settled by the state supreme court today, which held in favor of the schedule of the order of railroad telegraphers.

The opinion written by Justice Harry Belt, reversed the findings of the Union county circuit court, presided over by J. W. Knowles, and dismissed the suit against the railroad company brought by Tom B. Burton of Nyssa. The lower court had held with Burton. Neither party will recover costs, the court decreed.

Burton brought suit against the railroad on April 23, 1932. He had been employed as a second clerk telegrapher at Kamela. After the consolidation he was rated as number 177 out of 199 employees, while he claimed he should have been 61. As a result of the rating he was later relieved from service.

The railroad company stated it had conformed as to seniority rights with the schedule issued by the telegraphers union, and that the union had approved the new listing. Judge Belt held with the defendant.

ARNOLD MOUNT OF JORDAN VALLEY, DIES

Jordan Valley—Arnold Mount, 31, of Jordan Valley, died last Monday at the Vale sanatorium after a lingering illness. He had been a patient at the sanatorium for about 10 days. He was well known in the Jordan Valley section where he was engaged in ranching.

He was a son-in-law of Carleton Fretwell, having married Miss Winifred Fretwell. She and three children survive him.
