

PROCESSING TAX IS EXPLAINED

There is considerable misunderstanding in connection with the processing tax on hogs as it affects the hog producer. According to county agent R. G. Larson the most recent ruling on this matter is as follows:

"The farmer who slaughters hogs which he raised from birth is required to pay the processing tax only when he sells the meat direct to the person or family who eats it. If he sells it to a butcher or peddler or a hotel or restaurant or anybody else except the person who actually eats it, the said person to whom the meat is sold must pay the tax."

The following provisions as originally announced in connection with the processing tax have not been changed: "A farmer must pay the processing tax on meat from hogs which were not actually his when farrowed, regardless of how much or to whom he sells. A farmer is entitled to sell 300 lbs. of pork, live weight, without paying a processing tax providing it is meat from pigs that were born his and providing he does not sell more than a total of 1000 lbs. during the year. If he sells more than 1000 lbs. to actual consumers, if a farmer is then classified as a commercial meat man and he must pay the processing tax on all that he sells, no matter whether or not he raised the hogs."

The amount of the processing tax will continue to be \$2.25 per hundred lbs. figuring on a live weight basis.
