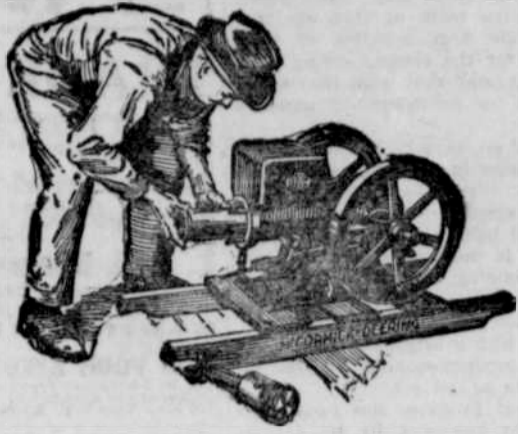

Looks Encouraging

Washington, Jan. 7.—Owyhee, the neglected sister among reclamation projects of Oregon, got a toe hold on the interior department appropriation bill last night when the senate accepted an amendment offered by senator smoot making available for the next fiscal year the \$315,000 appropriated by the hangover deficiency bill passed in November. Owyhee was not mentioned in the house bill, and unless the amendment is upheld in conference committee, the project will have no money after June 30.

On motion of senator McNary, the senate inserted \$100,000 for the Vale project as recommended in a supplemental estimate from the budget, it having been decided that this item might as well be carried in the interior bill as to wait for a deficiency bill.
