## BASKETBALL TIPOFFS

The local players gave a mighty good account of themselves this past week end in their first games of the season. Although lack of practice was clearly evident against Emmett, who have already had several games; they gave the last year champions a big scare as it was only a last minute basket that finally clinched the game for them. Johnston showed promise in that game of making plenty of trouble for the opposition this season. He was able to shake his guard time after time and get in the clear for a shot and a good percentage of them were good for counters.

The boys played an even better game against Emmett Saturday night. Shifting of Arthur Cook from the second to the varsity squad strengthened the team and Nyssa was leading 13 to 23 at half time. The second half was a different story however. The locals were held to 11 points while Emmett found the basket for a total of 28, over twice as many as they were able to score in the first half. This was probably partially accounted for by the fact that some of Nyssa's best defense went out via the foul route and also due to Emmett's superior reserve strength. However, both the scholo officials and fans were well satisfied with the showing the boys made in their first two games of the season.

In the game Saturday night, Sager was going in much better than the night before, taking the ball off the backboard and shooting the close ones to make high score honors. Holly too, showed definite improvement and was getting the tip-off more than his share of the time. Spencer has been playing a good floor game but has not yet hit the fast pace he set last year in scoring.

Next Friday, or tomorrow night, should bring out some close basketball games. Fruitland will be entertained here and the Fruitland school has the habit of turning out good teams. Saturday night the locals will take on Parma, who conquered Weiser Friday night and so must have a team of real players again this year. Weiser comes to Nyssa for a game Saturday night, January 19th.

There have been some very definite rumors about the organization of a town team here in Nyssa. Several neighboring towns have such teams already organized, including Parma, Huntington and Payette and all are anxious to play Nyssa. Last Friday the Parma team played the College of Idaho in a preliminary game before the high school game between Parma and Weiser, but the College was a little too much for the Parma town boys.

### ENDLESS CHAIN INSURANCE NOT AUTHORIZED IN OREGON

Salem, Ore., Jan. 4.—(Special)—An endless chain scheme under the sponsorship of the Sterling Casualty Insurance Company of Chicago, Illinois, a company which is not authorized to transact an insurance business in Oregon, is reported by Insurance Commissioner A. H. Averill to be now in progress. Under the plan offered, anyone selling three policies of insurance for the company is entitled to receive a commission, and each purchaser of a policy likewise becomes eligible to sell three policies to three friends and to receive commissions therefor.

Commissioner Averill states that individual participating in a proposition such as this are violating the insurance law, and should such a violation be brought to his attention, immediate action against the offender would be taken by his office.
