Census enumerators started work Tuesday taking the farm census in Malheur county. There has been thirteen enumerators appointed; with three precincts yet unapportioned. The unapportioned precincts are (1) Jordan, Juniper and Mahogany; (2) Crowley and Rome; (3) McDermitt.

A. R. McCall was in Ontario Monday, instructing the enumerators and making arrangements for the work to proceed. He left for Burns and expects to include Canyon City on his trip before returning to headquarters at La Grande.
