EASTERN OREGON HELPED BY DROUTH SPRINGS AND WELLS

The cooperative project by the Drouth Relief service and the Oregon SERA to provide wells and improve springs in the drouth stricklast week with Mrs. A. Ellerbrook. en eastern Oregon livestock country resulted in the improvement of 3000

prings and the establishment of 3000 wells, of direct benefit to 705 familles in 10 eastern Oregon counties. according to a compilation just made by P. M. Bandt of Oregon State college, assistant drouth relief director for this state.

The permanent improvement of the water facilities over this vast area has been described as one of the best SERA projects yet attempted, and the efficient method by which it was carried out under the direction of Ivan Oakes, district engineer for the SERA, has attracted much attention, even outside of Oregon, according to reports received by Professor Brandt. As soon as money was received from the fedaral government last July, earmarked for this emergency work.



The cost for materials and equipment amounted to approximately \$53,000, while the increased value of these permanent improvements to the ter-"iory is estimated at more than \$320,000. More than a million and a quarter acres of range land are affected by the improvements, serving a livestock population of more than 32,000 head of cattle and 575,000 head of sheep. Grant, Crook and Harney counties received the largest number of improved springs, while Harney and Umatilla were the location of most of the new wells. The list of improvements in Malheur county indude 6 springs, benefiting 31 famlies with the value at \$18,450. The total number of springs was 300, families 591, value \$118.670. The total number of wells was 26, famlies served 114, value \$202,500.
