to the number of dependants and the need. They are paid at the rate of fifty cents an hour and are allowed to work only the amount of their budget, whether it be \$12, \$25 or \$50 or whatever their monthly budget may call for.

The only ones eligible to get on the FERA rolls are those who are in need of work and who are able to work out the direct relief given them. If they are unemployable, that is unable to work, they are not supposed to be on the FERA but according to Ray Duncan, supervisor they should look to the county for aid.
