The moral of that, of course, is to advertise in the Journal if you really want to get your message before the public.

Another case of radio vs newspaper was recently enacted in southern Idaho. A sale was advertised in the newspapers to be held on a certain date but due to a heavy snow fall, it was thought best to postpone the sale and two announcements were made over the radio to this effect. A few hours before the sale was to have been held, plows cleared the roads and cars by the dozens flocked in; thinking there was to be a sale. When told that the sale was postponed and had been announced over the radio, a majority of the disappointed buyers said, "Why didn't you put it in the paper, we never pay any attention to radio advertisements." The sale was re-advertised in the newspapers and a big sale resulted.

MAIL ORDER HOUSES AFTER BUSINESS—

A few days ago the Sears, Roebuck & Co. mail order house mailed out 3000 tons of catalogues. Last week the people of Nyssa also received catalogues from the Montgomery Ward mail order concern. These concerns have spent hundreds of thousands of dollars to put these catalogues over the country and it is evident that these firms have faith in the renewal of farm buying power.

However we want you to give your home town merchant a fair trial. Don't take it for granted that you can make a better buy from these concerns. Don't be too anxious to send your cash to some distant city while your home town merchant, who has stuck with you through thick and thin extended credit when his own creditors were howling at his back; don't be too quick to drop him without a fair trial. As a matter of fair play, he deserves an opportunity to make the sale.

Examine the ads in the Journal, come to Nyssa and see the goods.

NEWSPAPER OR RADIO ADS?

Probably every one of our readers has heard at some time or another the statement that the radio would eventually take the place of the newspaper. While it is doubtful if very many believe such a statement, a little incident that happened right here at home home illustrates just how advertising compares with newspaper advertising.

Last week at the John Reese sale the auctioneer was Col. Amos Miller, an able auctioneer of Caldwell who uses the radio to broadcast sale news, coming farm sale dates and other items of interest. He asked the crowd how many heard the announcement over the radio, saying that he was paying for the opportunity of broadcasting and wanted to know what results he was getting. He asked for a showing of hands and from the number of hands that went up, it was evident that practically no one was at the sale be-

take into consideration the merchant is helping educate the children of this community, helping pay for the sidewalks you walk on and the streets you drive over. Ask yourself if the catalogue house ever sold you a bill of groceries, a pair of shoes, a window pane, a set of tires, a sack of chicken feed or a new hammer unless they had the cash with the order. Then if your conscience doesn't bother you, go ahead and patronize these firms who are grabbing off the dollars all over the county and putting them in New York banks for the benefits of who—certainly not Nyssa.

However, there is much to be said. These catalogues will enter every nook and corner of the United States. They will be studied evenings in countless homes. Articles will be pictured and described in detail. Too often the home merchant fails to make this sales effort. Instead, he has taken too seriously the adage that if one has the best mouse-trap, the world will make a pathway to his door, unmindful of the truth that now roads and mails lead in all directions and that business may be expected to come to those who adjust themselves to conditions of the time.
