PORK PROCESSING TAXES STATED IN SIMPLE FORM

Much misunderstanding and lack of information still exists among growers regarding their liability—or lack of it—for paying processing taxes on hogs slaughtered by themselves, reports Chas. W. Smith, emergency county agent leader and head of the educational campaign

for the 1935 corn-hog program in Oregon. Reduced to their simplest form the rules might be stated as follows, he says:

The producer pays no tax when he slaughters hogs of his own raising and sells them dressed to commercial handlers. He pays no tax on slaughtering of his own hogs for consumption by his family or employees.

Dressed hogs or hog products sold by the grower direct to consumers are exempt up to 300 pounds. On all over 300 pounds the tax must be paid, and if total direct sales exceed 1000 pounds in any marketing year the exemption is forfeited even on the first 300 pounds. The marketing year started last November 5.

Written records must be kept to obtain exemption, and these must show, date, number slaughtered, live weight, weight of products sold and names and addresses of customers and estimated weight of home used products. Tax returns are filed with the Collector of Internal Revenue at Portland in the month following the slaughtering.

WORLD PROBLEMS TO BE DISCUSSED BY NOTED SPEAKER

People of the Snake river valley will have an unusual opportunity Tuesday, April 9 to hear a discussion of current world problems by Alden G. Alley of Washington D. C. One of America's foremost students of the subject, Mr. Alley, traveling secretary for the National Council for the Prevention of War, will speak in the Ontario high school auditorium that evening under the auspices of local committee for the prevention of war in Ontario, Vale, Nyssa, Payette, Pruitland, New Plymouth, Weiser and also the Payette valley ministerial association.

President Roosevelt's foreign policy, Fascism, the Japanese question and the proposed naval maneuvers in the Pacific are some of the questions Mr. Alley will speak about.

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THE word which the bank officer likes best is "Yes". There is a very good reason for this—the best reason in business. For when the bank says "No" to a prospective borrower, it is turning away business. The bank wants to loan money. Its very success is chiefly dependent upon its ability to place sound loans. It wants to say "Yes" to applicants for loans whenever it can safely do so.

When an officer of the bank is considering an application for a loan he must keep in mind the two parties most concerned. They are the applicant and the depositors from whom he is asking to borrow. The applicant is seeking the bank's "Yes". At the same instance the depositors are asking if the loan is a safe one. They expect the bank to take no chances with their money. The bank must be able to answer "Yes" to their question. It must make certain that the "Yes" to the applicant is not in the same breath a "No" to the depositors. In making this decision, the bank must remember that the depositors have the first claim to the "Yes." You will agree to the justice of this. It is their money.

The bank officer is always pleased when he can satisfy both parties with his answer. In order to do so, he must be assured of the safety of the loan. It must be one for any legitimate business use other than expansion of capital and there must be positive assurance of its repayment within a few months. With such a loan he can say "Yes" to the depositors. Ask for such a loan and the reply to you will be an immediate, enthusiastic and even appreciative "Yes."

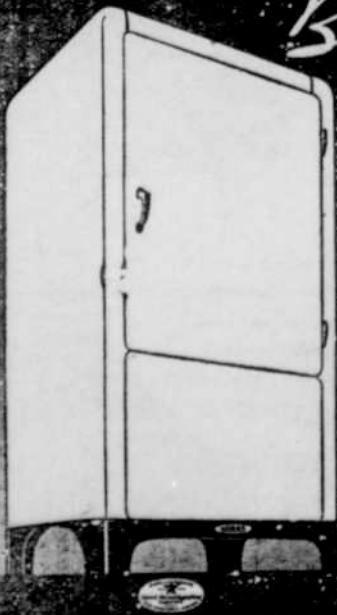
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
