A Washington report to the Associate Director Oregon PHA activities states, that up to the end of March a total of 6,838 Better Housing community chairmen had been appointed, 5,422 communities had organized and 2,454 Better Housing canvasses. Canvassers reported almost 7,000,000 calls made and started. Work pledged was valued at \$319,763,055.
