To Mr. Berwyn Burke Publisher, Gate City Journal, Nyssa, Oregon—It has been a great deal of interest to me to read, in some of the recent issues of the Gate City Journal, the controversy between groups from Boise and Caldwell and from Nyssa, Vale and surrounding towns over the proposed routing of the now famous I-O-N Highway. Of course you would hardly expect the thought of patriotism to enter such an argument. But in my mind it does and for this reason. In the event the Pacific coast is attacked and landed on by a hostile force, the matter of movement of military forces becomes a paramount issue. This movement, would of necessity, have to be made before it reached the coast. (There being accessible only four routes, by rail, to the coast). For this reason the I-O-N should be considered also for its military use, in the event that becomes necessary. And should not for that reason, be "throttled off" at any point short of joining other highways to the north and south that would give this country a highway from the Canadian line to the Mexico. ALL of this highway to be east of the mountains. After all the State of Idaho has already a first class highway that joins the proposed I-O-N route, thru Nyssa. Why burden the taxpayers of that State with more taxes? A short study of any good highway map will soon disclose the reasonableness of the above argument. It's time that we shut off these small fry politicians from their rantings and glib tongued oratory. Put the I-O-N thru Nyssa and the entire country including the western portion of Idaho will benefit beyond the wildest hopes of these enthusiasts. Such a road will prove to be one of the best investments the State of Oregon and Idaho have ever made, by opening up a means of transportation for the produce of that territory surrounding Nyssa, to California—which state has already learned of the wonderful quality of produce from that section. It might be well to suggest to the committee on the I-O-N to contact Congresswoman Florence Kahn, chairman of the House Military Affairs committee, and enlist her support for the I-O-N, from the military angle of it. —Louis Thomas.
