CHANGES GIVEN IN MOTOR LAWS

Turned out in the Oregon state legislative mill during the last regular session were many new motor vehicle laws, several of which, when they become effective, will be of vital importance to every man who owns or operates a automobile.

This was pointed out by Earl Snell, secretary of state, in an article which appeared in the April issue of the Oregon Motorist, a magazine published by the Oregon State Motor association.

A form of legislation entirely new to Oregon, according to Mr. Snell, is the safety "responsibility" act, which will go into effect July 1. This measure, a part of the uniform motor vehicle code, is already in effect in more than 20 states.

The law will be felt only by the motorist who is involved in an accident and who is held responsible by courts for the death or bodily injury of any person, or for damage to property of others in amount exceeding \$100. Such a person may not drive again until he has satisfied final judgment and furnished proof of his ability to respond to damages caused by him in the future.

Mr. Snell's article carries a complete, official and easily understood summary of the safety responsibility act.

Another change which has aroused much interest among motorists is the amendment to the right of way law, giving the driver on the right the right of way at intersections. Under the old rule, the driver entering the intersection first had the right of way. This became effective June 12.

Besides this new legislation, other important changes outlined by Mr. Snell were as follows:

Persons arrested on charge of driving while intoxicated immediately shall be examined by physician.

Secretary of state authorized to issue temporary driver's permits to applicants for operators' licenses.

Necessity of obtaining notary public's signature on applications for operators' or chauffeurs' licenses eliminated.

Registration fees for motor trucks, trailers and semi-trailers reduced 10 cents per hundred pounds, those weighing 2000 pounds or less excepted.

Either annual or semi-annual licenses may be obtained for many commercial type vehicles.

Flat rate of \$10 per year prescribed for certain commercial vehicles which, together with load, weigh not to exceed 4000 pounds.

Maximum allowable load upon

any vehicle or combination of vehicles from 40,000 to 54,000 pounds.

Trucks used in SERA work may be operated with temporary permit costing \$5.

Any city having population of 100,000 or more may adopt city ordinance calling for periodic inspection of motor vehicles.

Private passenger vehicle owners residing in adjoining states may

drive in Oregon throughout the year if properly registered in state of residence.

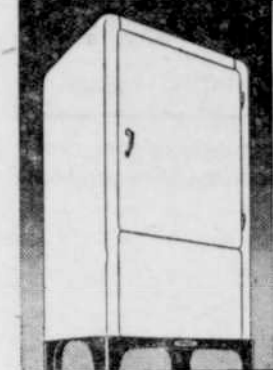
