**TIME TO SPRAY
FOR ELM BEETLES**

Damage from the elm leaf beetle is now making its appearance in the elm trees in this vicinity and the time is rapidly drawing near when control measures must be applied if the elm trees are not to be seriously damaged and in many cases killed by this pest.

According to county agent R. G. Larson, the first evidence of the elm beetle is small round holes in the elm leaves, these holes having been eaten out by the adult beetle while the egg laying is taking place. Careful examination will show clusters of small yellow eggs on the lower surface of the leaves. In about two or three weeks after these eggs are laid they hatch and the larvae of the beetle emerges and does the damage to the trees by eating off the green tissues of the leaves. Where these larvae are numerous, the leaves are entirely skeletonized and the entire tree turns brown by mid-summer. About two years without any control will usually result in the death of the tree.

The most satisfactory measure is spraying with arsenate of lead at the rate of three pounds of arsenate of lead to the 100 gallons of water. Spraying must be applied just as soon as larvae make their appearance on the leaves. If thoroughly applied, one spraying should result in satisfactory but not complete control.

The city of Nyssa sprayed the trees around town on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week, and if necessary, another spray will be applied later.

**OREGON TO PRODUCE TONS
OF CRESTED WHEAT SEED**

Eastern Oregon will produce about 40,000 pounds of crested wheat grass seed this year given favorable conditions from now on, says E. R. Jackman, extension agronomist at Oregon State college. A recent inspection of eastern Oregon plantings shows the prospective crop divided among the counties about as follows: Baker 700 pounds; Deschutes 2000; Gilliam, 2000; Grant, 6000; Lake, 1000; Malheur, 2000; Sherman, 500; Umatilla, 8000; Union, 10,000 and Wallowa county, 1500.

Crested wheat grass is coming into great demand through the national movements to check soil erosion and to seed grass on land no longer productive for grain farming. In nearly all the areas west of the Mississippi river and north of Kansas, crested wheat grass is about the only dry land grass worth considering for pasture purposes, Jackman reports.

This will be the first year that Oregon has produced this seed in commercial quantities. A start is thus made to swell Oregon's seed industry which already amounts to about two million dollars per year, says Jackman.
