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Preliminary Work Started On Nyssa CCC Camp

Main Body CCC Recruits Expected to Arrive 1st of July.

Preliminary work is well started on Nyssa's CCC camp located near the Terteling camp southwest of Nyssa, with the well reaching a depth of 110 feet Thursday. However it is expected that it will be necessary to go deeper to hit a good flow of water. De Coura of Ontario has the contract to drill the well.

At the present time there are 27 CCC boys in the camp, with two permanent officers, Capt. Daniel Baugh of Kentucky and Lieut. R. C. Hilliard of West Virginia and one temporary officer, Lieut. Arthur Crow of Salt Lake City. Lieut. Crow is located permanently at the Bruneau camp in Idaho and is over here to help establish the Nyssa camp. All the men are Reserve army officers.

Bids were opened Saturday on lumber for the camp but up to date it has not arrived. Just as soon as the lumber arrives in Nyssa, carpenters will be employed to construct some 20 buildings for the camp. As the camp is to be a permanent year round camp, the buildings will be solidly constructed and the camp will have electric lights, plumbing system, recreation halls, mess hall and sleeping quarters for over 200 men.

Most of the boys in camp now are local experienced men, drawn from Medford, Oregon and the Gallagher CCC camp in Idaho. The CCC recruits will be drawn principally from east of Chicago and are expected to arrive between the 1st and 15th of July. Just what work the boys will be assigned to is undecided but will work under the direction of the Bureau of Reclamation.

YOUNGMAN HURT IN CAR ACCIDENT

Allen Stuckers, known about Nyssa as "Coon" Garman, suffered a compound fracture of the left arm early Friday morning when his car collided with a truck loaded with cement tile near the Langdon Service Station south of Nyssa. For a time it was thought that an amputation would be necessary but doctors are of the opinion now that they will be able to save the injured arm.

The accident happened when the car, a Ford roadster, met the truck, driven by a man named Patterson, crashing into the loaded truck as the two vehicles attempted to pass each other. Too much speed is said to have been a contributing factor in the accident. Stucker was driving with his arm over the side of the car and it received the full impact of the collision, breaking it in three places. He was taken to the Ontario hospital and is still in that institution. With Stucker were Doris and Theda Green, but neither of the girls were seriously injured. The car is a complete wreck with one side entirely caved in.

WATER IS TURNED BACK IN DITCHES FOLLOWING BREAK

Water Pouring Into Owyhee Dam at the Rate of 12,000 feet daily.

Water was turned back into the ditch for use of Kingman Colony farmers Wednesday and it is expected to arrive in the Colony sometime today. Water was shut off Tuesday, May 28 when a break occurred above the Mendola place. A big crew has been busy repairing the break and a night shift was added this week to rush the work.

Water has been running into the Owyhee dam the past few warm days at the rate of 12,000 acre feet daily, bringing the total amount of live storage close to the 400,000 mark. However it is the opinion of many that the frequent breaks in the new ditches and the resultant shutting off of water have harmed the crops in that district, although it is hard to estimate the actual damage at this time.

Engineers state that breaks are to be expected in new ditches, and last week a bad break occurred on the Vale project near Little Valley. It was necessary to shut the water off for a week to repair the damage.

ARRESTED FOR TAKING SEED

Rex Hansen of Halfway, Oregon, was arrested last Thursday, afternoon in Nyssa by Sheriff Chas. Glenn, Deputy Leavitt and City Marshal A. V. Cook, and brought before Judge Purvis in Vale on a charge of having stolen property in his possession. He pleaded guilty and was assessed a fine of \$25 and costs.

The annual school meeting of District No. 26 will be held at the high school Monday, June 17th, beginning at two o'clock. At that time one director will be elected for a term of three years and a clerk elected for a term of one year. Other business of interest to school patrons of this district will also come before the meeting.

F. H. Hogue and Idaho Equity Exchange Start 30-day Pea Harvest.

Harvesting of the first crop for 1935 will get started tomorrow when both the F. H. Hogue company and the Idaho Equity Exchange will start their crews picking and packing early peas. Some lettuce will probably be handled next week, although the hot weather is damaging the lettuce prospects to some extent. There is not a great deal of early lettuce in this section this year.

Prospects are excellent for a good crop of peas, and during the height of the season it is estimated that probably in excess of 2,000 people will find employment handling this crop. Present indications are that pickers will be paid 20c for picking a 30 pound hamper, with a two cent bonus.

The F. H. Hogue organization expects to start their crew working on early peas, using about 400 pickers in the field and from 40 to 50 in the packing shed. The Idaho Equity Exchange expects to use from 100 to 400 pickers in the field during the season and will use up to 40 workers in the packing shed. During the peak season, starting about June 15 and continuing until sometime in July, these crews will be greatly increased. There is a considerable acreage of carrots in the district and the Hogue organization expects to have quite a run on carrots beginning shortly after the Fourth of July, and will probably handle from 50 to 60 cars of this crop, in addition to approximately 125 cars of peas. The Idaho Equity expects to handle from 25 to 30 cars of peas, making over 150 cars of this crop to be shipped from the Nyssa section.

Tom Eldridge will be fieldman for the Hogue company with Frank Constantine as shed foreman Harry Garrett of Council will be the accountant, Wayne Brand will be in charge of harvesting and Tom Cledening will be the shed foreman and C. A. Rogers will be in charge of harvesting.

FIND RICH ORE ON WILSON CLAIM

Ernest Wilson and his two sons, Robert and Lloyd, went to Baker Sunday to inspect some mining property in which Mr. Wilson has an interest. In the Baker Democrat Herald for Wednesday the following article appeared, which is self explanatory.

Two pieces of quartz richly interlaced with gold were brought to the First National bank this week by Bert Miller of Austin and occasioned a stir reminiscent of the days when such specimens were common occurrences. Mr. Miller found the quartz, which is float in character, on his Brown Bear claim No. 1, located on Deep creek near Galena.

The larger piece weighs 28 ounces, and the miner estimates it to contain one-half gold or about \$500. The small piece, which weighs 24 ounces, is less rich.

"I should judge by the roughness of the gold," Mr. Miller said yesterday, "that the ledge must be about two feet further up the hill."

Miller and his partners, W. H. Miller of Baker and Ernest Wilson, merchant of Nyssa, own three Brown Bear claims located two miles west of the Gem mine. The place where the quartz was found by Miller is just one-half mile west of the spot where the famous Armstrong nugget, valued at \$2500, was found 15 years ago. Miller went to the Sumpter and Greenhorn districts as a merchant during the mining boom in 1900. His first store was in Whitney. In connection with mining, he operates a service station on the John Day highway at the Bates-Austin junction.

He will leave the quartz, a fascinating object to even those not familiar with ores at the bank until after the Baker Mining Jubilee July 3 and 4.
