The Reason For Short-Term Loans

WHICH would you rather do—loan a man a sum of money for three months or loan it to him for five years? Even though you are making the loan because of the interest you will receive, would you not prefer to keep lending for short periods, thus giving you frequent checks upon the borrower's inclination and ability to repay you?

When the bank loans money, it feels exactly as you would feel. But this is only one of several reasons why the bank insists upon short-term loans. The money which you might loan would be your money, but money loaned by the bank belongs to its depositors. It must be available to them at all times. The bank cannot tell its depositors that having loaned their money, they cannot have it until the loans are repaid. This money must be kept constantly turning over, so that enough is being continuously paid back to the bank to take care of both normal and even abnormal withdrawals upon the part of the depositors.

Then again, the bank desires to serve as many of its customers as possible. When you want a loan and it is one which the bank can favor, we want to be able to grant it. We could not do so if all our available funds were out on long-term loans.

Borrowers sometimes say to the bank that because it is our business to loan money they should be able to borrow it for as long as they may wish, providing they pay their interest when due. Perhaps this will help them to understand the bank's position. Short-term loans assure greater safety, more liquidity and enable the bank to serve more customers.

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
