UPPER CLASSES SLOW UP BIRTH RATE, ASSERTED

Washington (Washington Bureau of the Journal)—If the established trends of population in the United States are maintained, the number of people will increase slowly for about 10 years, during which time about 5,000,000 will be added. Then the population will become practically stationary.

This is the estimate of Dr. O. E. Baker of the bureau of agricultural economics, department of agriculture who is widely recognized as an authority. He notes that the American birth rate has been declining for 100 years, but not until 1931 did the actual number of births begin to fall. In that year nearly 3,000,000 young Americans were born, but in 1934 only 2,300,000.

These studies of Dr. Baker and of others engaged in the same research are significant in several matters of legislation. Many have wondered why the estimates of cost of old age pensions are so high. His conclusion that "the number of old people will increase about one-third in each decade" helps to explain that.

In the last five years, he says, the number of persons over 65 has increased 17 per cent and the number of young children is 10 per cent less. City families of four or five children were numerous a few years ago, but the usual number today is one or two. In the country the percentage of children is higher.

He further finds that the scarcity of children is most pronounced among the middle and upper classes. The families of professional men have from 5 to 10 per cent fewer children than those of business men, while business men rank 25 per cent under the skilled workers. These in turn are 30 per cent below the unskilled laborers.

The check in population also has its meaning in plans for the future of agriculture. Lacking more people, there will be no need for growing more crops, unless people eat more or the export demand returns. For at least 30 years, says Dr. Baker, the individual consumption of food has decreased a little, rather than increased. This is due at least in part, he thinks, to the increasing number of people engaged in indoor work whose appetites are only "middling."
