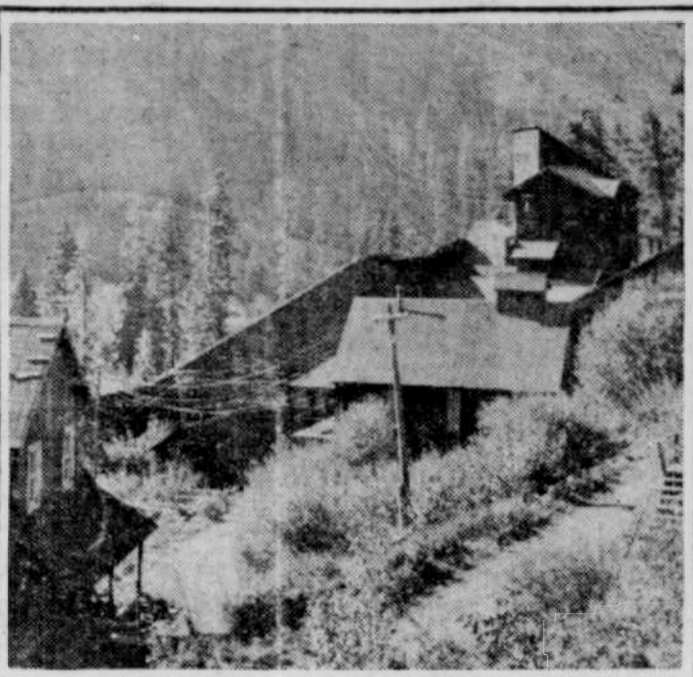
**PACKARD-DIETRICK**

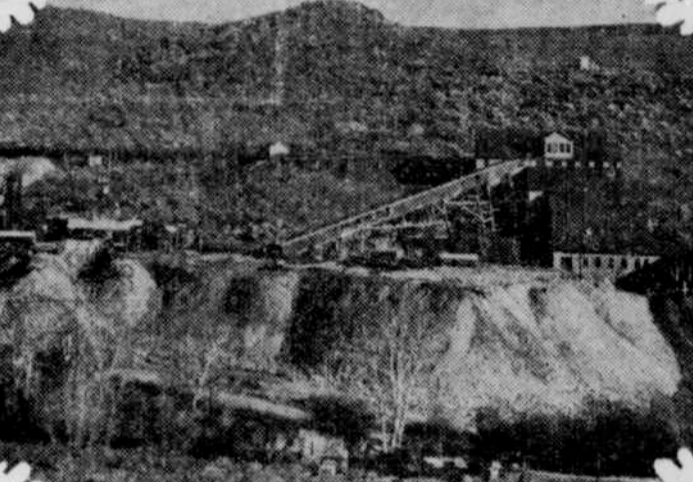
The couple will make their home in Jordan Valley.

**Baker to Celebrate Gold Mining Activity**

It's Gold! No matter how, by dredge, pick or mill, it remains eastern Oregon's most important industry to be celebrated with the Baker Mining Jubilee July 3-4.

Nosing its way with 73 nine cubic-foot buckets through 7000 yards or more of dirt a day this dredge will operate continuously for at least eight years. Mrs. W. H. Cullers of Portland, wife of the president of the Sumpter Valley Dredging Company, christened the boat with champagne.

At Cornucopia the Baker mill tailings are being converted into gold from ore treated years ago under the cyanide process. The three-mile aerial span leading to the Last Chance claim was one of the longest in the world.

Concentrates are coming to Baker at the rate of 10 tons a day from Balm Creek mine where a 100-ton flotation plant was recently completed. Ore for a five-year operation is already blocked out. These are Baker county's best-known properties.

**CHIEF EXECUTIVE FAVORS IRRIGATION**

Washington—President Roosevelt, who last week told members of the house irrigation committee he would not approve Reclamation Commission Mead's 113 million dollar irrigation construction program, and would sanction only such projects individually as can be built within the \$1140 per man per year labor cost, including materials, Tuesday assured a group of western senators he would approve Dr. Mead's program, and intimated they might expect action not later than next Monday.

Furthermore, the President, after hearing plain talk about the folly of attempting to build big irrigation projects with \$1140 labor limitations said that plan would not work, and intimation was given that reclamation projects be built under the old PWA program which means by contract, and at the prevailing wages. Dr. Mead's program includes five million dollars to start construction of the Roza unit of Yakima project, estimated to cost ultimately 11 million. Five million can

be used this year.

**Idaho Projects**

The largest Idaho projects to be carried through if the President authorizes work to proceed, will be commencement of the Payette or Black canyon project work with an initial allotment of million and half dollars. The ultimate cost will approximate four million. Two million recalled from an original four million allotted for upper Snake river storage also is to be refunded and made available, along with six hundred thousand for Arrowrock dam.

The President admitted to senators that Secretary Wallace still continues to oppose use of relief funds for bringing new lands under cultivation while he is trying to reduce farm acreage, and to meet this objection, the new program will be largely confined to projects that are to furnish supplemental water to lands already irrigated. That will not apply to Roza project, however, which is entirely new construction.

**More Land Needed**

The President related with some delight that reports had been made to him by groups of dieticians, who have found, after vast calculation, that if all citizens in the United States are placed on a well-rounded diet, it would be necessary to bring into cultivation fifty million acres more than was cultivated. In years of peak farm production, since which time 30 million acres have been tak-

en out of crop production. The President said he passed along this report to Secretary Wallace to assure him there is no danger in carrying through Dr. Mead's reclamation program, for in the main, that will slightly increase the farm area, but will vastly increase crop production by assuring a full water supply to lands to be benefited.
