U. O. SCIENTISTS TO SEEK

DATA ON ANCIENT RACES

University of Oregon, Eugene—Facts about the private life of people who roamed in Oregon hundreds of years before the white man arrived will be the objective of an anthropological expedition of the University of Oregon which left this week, headed for the famed Steen Mountain country in Central Oregon. Under the leadership of Dr. Luther S. Crossman, professor of anthropology and sociology, the party will include five men, three of whom are summer session students.

Dr. Crossman himself will collect data and take photographs, while maps of the region will be made by Major R. H. Back, instructor in military science here. The students in the party are Howard Stafford and Lloyd Ruff, Eugene, and Fred Voigt, Portland.

The anthropologists will go first Bend, where recently two strange to Wickiup Mountain, not far from Knives, believed to have belonged to some early Indian tribe, were recently found. A search for more relics will be made, and Dr. Crossman will attempt to identify these artifacts.

Most of the time will be spent on Steen Mountain, in East Harney county, where recently a cave containing baskets, pottery and other relics was found. Work done on these artifacts is found nowhere else in the state, except among the Modoc Indians of Klamath, it is stated some highly interesting and important data should be uncovered here, Dr. Crossman believes. About four weeks will be spent on the trip, most of which will be devoted to extensive study of this region.

The venture has been made possible by a grant of funds from the Carnegie Institution, and by assistance from local residents.

Using Honey

Extracted or strained honey is liquid honey obtained by uncapping the combs and forcing the honey from the cells by centrifugal motion, and differs from comb honey only in the absence of the comb.

Because honey is a liquid sweet, it blends much more readily with many ingredients. In the case of fruit salad, it is not necessary to stir the fruit to dissolve sugar crystals; just arrange the fruit mixture on a nest of lettuce then drizzle lightly with honey. Since honey is liquid it quickly penetrates and flavors the fruit.

Honey Meringue

Many delightful Salad Dressings can be made with honey.

Honey Meringue has many uses and keeps well in refrigerator. The mixture should be placed in a flat bowl uncovered. Two methods for making follow:

Electric beater—Use 1-3 to ½ cup of honey to one egg white. Put in bowl of mixer on speed 2. Allow mixture to whip until it peaks. This can be used on cakes or with whipped cream or puddings.

Hand beater: Put ¼ cup honey with one egg white and beat vigorously until stiff.

For Fruit Salad—Add 1 teaspoonful prepared mustard, 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 1 cup honey meringue.

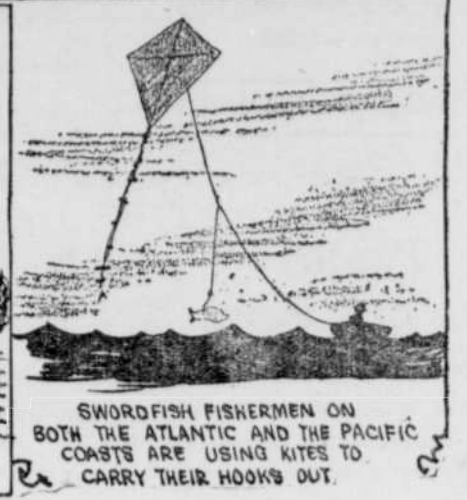
