Drouth Winds Blow

Hay Dollars to Many
Oregon Pockets

Confirming the old adage that "It is an ill-wind that blows no one any good," more than half a million dollars were swept into the pockets of Oregon farmers by the wind which parched middle western meadows last year and lifted top soil of that section and scattered it into swirling dust clouds, says E. R. Jackman, extension specialist in farm crops at Oregon State college.

When drouth directors, SERA and PERA purchasing agents, county agents and hay dealers throughout the drouth areas were notified of a surplus of hay in Oregon by exten-

sion workers in this state, there was immediate demand for shipment of clover and alfalfa hays. Little interest was shown in oats and vetch hay at first because it is little known in the middle west, but samples and chemical analyses soon removed doubts as to its quality.

Western Oregon had its biggest hay crop in history last year and eastern Oregon had a surplus in some sections, just at a time when mid-western stock were faced with empty barns, Jackman recalls. Numerous difficulties appeared in the way of ready movement of hay east, however.

County Agent Larson of this county had to make a special trip east to clear up a quarantine tangle. Railroad rates were at first prohibitive but were lowered to emergency levels in view of the vast tonnage and the apparent need. Difficulties in getting buyers and sellers together were reduced by making Jackman's office a clearing house, with county agents here and in the drouth areas serving as "field men."

Movements of hay from Oregon continued well into the spring, reaching an estimated volume of 75,000 tons. Efforts are being made to get more exact figures. Price ranged from \$8 to \$11 per ton on the cars for most of the hay. This is not a particularly high price but in view of the surplus in Oregon it made a profitable outlet compared with what could have been received locally, says Jackman.

Growers Scan New Draft of Wheat Plan Contract

New wheat contracts will probably be ready for producers' signatures sometime in July or early August, according to latest word received from Washington by the Oregon State college extension service. The new contract is to extend over the four-year period beginning with 1936.

To consider final suggestions for improving the new contracts, grower representatives from wheat producing states were called to confer in Washington July 1 and 2 with Chester C. Davis, administrator, and George E. Farrell, head of the grain division of the AAA.

Will Steen, chairman of the Umatilla county wheat control association, is the Oregon representative who is on this meeting. The conference of producers follows the referendum of a month ago when wheat growers voted 404,417 to 63,303 to continue wheat production adjustment.

SMOKERS CAUSE MOST FOREST FIRES

Careless smokers caused 16 of a total of 43 forest fires reported on the national forests of Oregon and Washington for the ten day period which ended June 30, according to the U. S. Forest Service. Of the remaining 27 fires, lightning caused 16; unextinguished camp fires 4; railroads 1; lumbering 1; debris burning 2; incendiary 1; and 3 were from miscellaneous causes.

The Forest officials point out that carelessness with matches, cigarettes, and campfires has caused more than half the fires on the national forests up to July 1 this year. "Carelessness each year is destroying thousands of acres of good fishing and recreational areas on private and publicly owned land" states the forest service.

"This carelessness can be prevented only by an aroused public interest on the part of the sportsmen and other thinking citizens."

BOND ISSUE DEFEATED AT APPLE VALLEY ELECTION

Sixty-five votes were cast at the special election, held last Friday at the Apple Valley school. Of these thirty-nine were against and twenty-nine for the bond issue. Fear of an additional amount in the present heavy tax burden seemed the main issue. No amount of explanation, figuring, or of future benefits could shake the belief that taxes would be very much increased.

Mrs. Levi Stephens and Mr. J. A. Pettit were judges of the election and Mrs. Earl Summy was clerk.—Parma Review.

BUDGET HEARING IS CALLED

Under the provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act, as amended by Chapter 250, Oregon Laws 1935, each Code or Marketing Agreement will be required to submit a budget of the proposed assessments and expenditures to the Director of Agriculture. This policy prevails in Washington as well as in Oregon.

The Oregon Department of Agriculture announces a public hearing to be held for this purpose and a committee of three will be appointed to consider and pass upon the reasonableness of budget expenditures. Anyone interested in the production or marketing of melons and tomatoes is invited to attend a hearing on the budget of the Oregon-Washington Melon and Tomato
