Using Honey

USING HONEY

A cup of honey weighs 12 ounces of which not quite 1-5 is water. A cup of sugar weighs 7 ounces. In a cup of honey there are approximately 8 1/2 ounces of sugar. Honey then contains a third more sugar than the same measure of cane sugar.

An easy and convenient way to measure honey is with a moist or greased cup, using the cup first for milk or shortening.

For camping steamed breads and puddings are easily made.

Steamed Brown Bread

2 cups graham flour, 1 cup corn meal, 1 cup honey, 2 cups sour milk, 2 teaspoons soda dissolved in sour milk, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt.
Beat all together, put in greased cans and set in hot water. Steam three hours.

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CENSUS SHOWS MORE FARMS IN OREGON

According to a report by the Bureau of the Census, there were 64,826 farms in the state of Oregon on January 1, 1925, which is an increase from 55,153 farms in 1930, when the regular census was taken. The figures for January 1935 were compiled from the Farm census taken last winter.

There are 1,648 farms in Malheur county, according to the census, with a total acreage of 823,711 and a value of \$9,611,651. There were 1,345 farms in 1930, with an acreage of 572,592 but the valuation was more, coming to \$12,669,032. Every county in the state, with the exception of Gilliam, Jefferson and Sherman had an increase in the number of farms during the five year period.
