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Potato Growers Hear New Marketing Plan Explained

Dealers and Growers Attempting to Stabilize Demoralized Potato Market.

Potato growers of Dead Ox flat and Oregon Slope communities met on Monday evening to consider a new set-up in the marketing of potatoes. The meeting was held on the lawn at the C. F. Smith home and was called by Lee Johnson, Commissioner of Agriculture for the State of Idaho and R. H. Young, potato grower of Parma community.

The purpose of the meeting was to explain to the Oregon potato growers a potato marketing plan which has been developed in southwestern Idaho through cooperation of potato dealers and growers. At a joint meeting of dealers and growers held atampa a few days ago, it was decided to stabilize the potato market. A price stabilization committee made up of dealers and growers was selected for the purpose of going over all available market information each morning and arriving at a minimum price in line with the markets for that day. Practically every dealer in the entire district has agreed not to attempt to buy under this minimum price and to quote out to the potato trade on the basis of this minimum.

In order that growers may be informed as to what this price is, just as soon as it is available each day, the price will be immediately phoned to Frank Gribben at Weiser, Idaho; the Palumbo Fruit Company at Payette and the County Agents' office at Ontario. Growers may call any of these places and learn what the minimum price for that day will be. This information will be available shortly after 10 o'clock each morning and will also be broadcast over KIDO during the noon hour.

In this organization, no effort has been made to get anyone to sign anything. It is purely a voluntary agreement entered into by dealers and growers in an effort to forestall an entirely demoralized potato market such as has been experienced in past years. Under this arrangement growers will be informed as to markets just as quickly as will the dealers. Growers are urged not to make sales below the minimum set each day.

POMONA GRANGE MEETS AT BIG BEND PARK THURSDAY

Grange To Ask for Federal Funds to Help Fight Noxious Weeds.

The Malheur County Pomona Grange held an interesting all-day meeting Thursday in the Big Bend Park, with approximately 80 present. A picnic lunch was enjoyed at noon, as well as a business and social session. Fourteen new members were given the obligation at the afternoon session.

Two new officers were elected to replace two members who are leaving the community. Mrs. M. M. Greeting of the Big Bend grange was elected as lecturer to replace Alice Ketchen and Mrs. Carol Loeys as Pomona to replace Mrs. Boyland. Mrs. Loeys is from the Eldorado grange at Ironside.

Due to the spread of noxious weeds such as white top, Russian knapweed, Canadian thistle, wild morning glory and others, a resolution was passed asking the Oregon representation in Congress to use their best efforts to secure an appropriation from the federal government of \$10,000 to be used in cooperation with Malheur county in the control and eradication of noxious weeds.

It was felt that strong measures would be necessary to control and eradicate these weeds before the infestation became so great that control and eradication would be completely prohibitive or impossible. The fact that to some extent the noxious weeds were on islands in streams and on public owned land tributary to streams, only makes the problem more difficult, the resolution stated. OCC workers, established in Malheur county by the federal government will provide several hundred workers who will be available for control and eradication of noxious weeds and if \$10,000 can be secured to supplement county funds, the problem can be attacked efficiently.

Another resolution commended Arthur H. Bone, a member of the executive committee, for an article in the Vale paper and subsequently republished in the Grange Bulletin, dealing with the liquor problem.

Boydell Breaks Arm In Accident

Blaney Boydell received a broken arm and his car was damaged somewhat, but otherwise no one was hurt when the Boydell car turned over three times about ten miles west of Huntington Thursday evening. Passengers in the car were Mr. and Mrs. Art Servoss, who were unhurt with exception of a slight cut suffered by Mr. Servoss.

The accident happened when the Boydell car attempted to pass a big oil truck and got too far over onto the shoulder of the road, hitting loose gravel and skidding over the embankment. Passing motorists took Mr. Boydell and Mr. Servoss to a doctor in Huntington and Mrs. Servoss later drove the car to Huntington under its own power.

Hollenberg has asked that all parents who will have children entering the first grade next year to see him or drop him a carding informing him of that fact.

Fire Destroys Farm Home

A defective gasoline stove, which exploded and threw flames about the room, was given as the cause of the fire which destroyed the Orville Clack home north of Nyssa Sunday evening. Mr. Clack attempted to light the stove but it apparently failed to burn, so he turned the burner down and started to pump it up when the explosion took place.

Flames were thrown about the room and onto Lorene Snow, a sister-in-law. She ran into a bedroom and was frantically trying to beat the flames out and in order for Mr. Clack to come to her assistance he had to throw the blazing stove outside. As a result he is nursing a badly burned hand. Lorene Snow suffered bad burns on the body and limbs and was taken to the hospital for treatment.

The house, a small frame structure, burned completely to the ground with practically no furniture or clothing saved. Mrs. Clack and children were able to get out of the building unharmed.

OILING BURNS VALE HIGHWAY TO BE STRONGLY URGED

Meeting Planned for August 14 In Burns to Lay Question Before Highway Officials.

A request that the highway from Vale to Burns be oiled for the entire distance will be asked of highway officials, according to a decision reached Saturday at a luncheon held at the Moore hotel in Ontario. At the luncheon was a delegation from Burns and representatives of the Commercial clubs of Nyssa, Ontario, Weiser, Caldwell, Nampa and Vale. The Burns club invited the various clubs to meet in their city on Wednesday, August 14th to further consider the problem and also to meet with highway officials to see what action might be expected.

The Burns delegation made the trip over to Ontario in less than three hours but stated that the new grade thrown up would not last under heavy traffic conditions and that oiling would be necessary to preserve the road. Oiling of this gap would mean throwing central Oregon open to tourists travel and would also mean a shorter route to coast points than either the John Day route or the Oregon Trail.

The Ontario Commercial club held a special luncheon with the delegates from Nyssa being Frank Morgan, Art Norcott and Berwyn Burke.

Homemakers Camp To Start On August 14th

The homemakers camp for Malheur county women will be held this year on August 14 to 18 inclusive at the Kiwanis Camp grounds at Payette Lakes.

The committee in charge is completing arrangements for the camp and it is believed that an interesting and restful camp is in prospect for the homemakers. Any homemaker in Malheur county over the age of 18 is eligible for this camp. Facilities make it necessary to limit the number who can attend to 75 women. Over 50 have already enrolled so that anyone desiring to go should get their registration in to the County Agent's office this week.

The cost of the camp will be \$3.50 in cash and a small amount of produce from the home supply.

This camp is one of fifteen different camps to be held in Oregon and which are directed by the Home Economics Extension staff of the State College. They make the statement that every camper will be free to spend her time as she wishes. Instructions will be provided for those who wish to participate. They desire this camp to be a real vacation for everyone who attends.

Truck Owners Under Set Rates

At a meeting held Monday and Tuesday, July 22 and 23rd in Ontario, truckers of Malheur County and the Oregon Public Utilities Commission arrived at a schedule of rates to be adhered to by truckers. This schedule of rates and charges is standard and is only subject to change by the Public Utilities Commission.

The farm produce rate on wheat, oats, barley, potatoes, beans, onions, peas, clover and alfalfa seed, rye, corn, feeds etc. was set at 5c per hundred for five miles or less. From 5 miles and not over 15 the rate is 10c per ton per mile additional. Over 15 miles the rate is 7c per ton per mile additional.

Loose hay is to be hauled for \$2.50 per ton for five miles or less, and 10c per ton per mile additional for over five miles.

Lettuce, carrots and green peas are to be hauled for 3c per crate for five miles or less and 1/2 cent per crate per each additional mile. Empty returns when loaded and unloading, help is furnished by shipper and \$1.00 per load when help is furnished by carrier.

The rate on baled hay is \$1.50 per ton for five miles or less and 10c per ton per mile for over 5 miles additional.

The standard rate is \$2 per hour for use of truck and driver and \$2.50 per hour for use of truck, driver and helper.

The rate on chopped hay was set at \$1.50 per ton for five miles or less and 15c per ton per mile additional for over 6 miles.

Another four round special event has been arranged between Harold Long of Arcadia and Lyle Cheney of Caldwell. Alf Parrish and Red Baird, both of Nyssa, will fight the preliminary. Norman Leavitt and Garnet Brooks will open the show with a four round curtain raiser.

NYSSA TO PLAY IN DOUBLE-HEADER AT PAYETTE

Nyssa will play the first game of a double-header attraction Sunday at Payette, the game starting at one o'clock. Following the Nyssa-Payette league battle, Payette will play the famous House of David team. It is expected that many fans from here will go to Payette to see both games.

Owyhee Project Shares In Funds

Congress passed the deficiency appropriation bill last week, carrying among other items an appropriation of \$1,500,000 for the Owyhee project and \$500,000 for the Burnt river project in Baker county. A total of \$3,340,000 was received for Oregon reclamation purposes. A million was appropriated to build a dam on the Deschutes river.

The Burnt river project involves the construction of a dam between Hereford and Unity to provide supplemental irrigation for some 8000 acres above the dam and 9000 acres below the dam. C. C. Ketchum of Vale assisted in organizing the Burnt river irrigation district last Tuesday.

Among other items, Ontario received an allocation of \$75,000 for a government building.

GOOD WHEAT YIELDS REPORTED

Frank Fry had an excellent yield of wheat combined this week by the C. P. Overstreet outfit; 15 acres of wheat averaging an even 60 bushels to the acre. The same outfit combined 4500 bushels of wheat off 80 acres for J. E. Hearron on the Pipe Line ranch.

Indications Are That The Eagles Rodeo Will Attract Huge Crowd to Nyssa for 2-day Show.

Interest is rising by leaps and bounds all over southern Idaho and eastern Oregon in the Eagles Rodeo, to be held in Nyssa on August 10th and 11th. Every day brings more inquiries from riders, concessioners, and the general public, and indications are that Nyssa will have to prepare to entertain a huge crowd on these two days.

The Moody string of bucking horses and wild cattle will arrive next Tuesday and the next three days will be spent getting the stock acquainted with the arena and arranging last minute details in order that the show may go over swiftly and smoothly. Mr. Moody was over Wednesday and made arrangements for the care of his string, which includes some of the most vicious horses and steers to be found in the west. Corral and chutes are being built to standard rodeo specifications to insure the fans a real show.

Additional bleacher space will be provided, and already 200 feet of new bleachers are in place. The large arena, is rapidly being enclosed by stout poles this week and when the gates swing open Saturday afternoon for the first rodeo events, everything will be in readiness to give the public the finest rodeo entertainment ever held in this section.

The Kennedy show, which includes several rides, shows and concessions will arrive next week and set up for the rodeo. Concessions are going good and every day sees the sale of one or more new concession rights for refreshment stands.

The boxing card, followed by a dance, is expected to draw a large crowd to Nyssa for Friday night, August 9th; the night before the rodeo show opens. A first class card has been arranged.

The Nyssa Eagles, who are sponsoring the show, are building the seats, arena, chutes and other necessary apparatus; all with volunteer help. The management has asked the Journal to sound a call to all Eagles to turn out and help build the structures. Several loyal members may be found every evening and many during the day, busy building the rodeo grounds, but with more help the work will be easier for everyone.

Fletcher Round-up band of Pendleton has been secured to not only play for the dances in the evening, but to play during the rodeo and announce events over their public address system.

Townsend Plan Subject of Talk

State senator L. I. Purcell of New Pimouth was the speaker at a meeting of the local Townsend club Friday evening in the Community church. A fair sized crowd attended the meeting.

Mr. Purcell told of the slight change in the original Townsend plan and said he was in favor of the new plan. The new plan provides for a guaranteed income of \$200 per month for every man and woman at the age of 60. If their present income from investments or other sources were say, \$100 a month, the government pension plan would add to this to make the total of \$200 per month. People whose income already was \$200 per month or more would not share in the plan.

Senator Purcell sounded a note of hope and encouragement, saying he was certain the plan would be adopted eventually and that members of the Townsend clubs should continue their fight to see the plan enacted.
