AID COMMISSION HAS

LANDS FOR SALE

A booklet of 54 pages in which is listed the more than 410 farm properties held by the World War Veterans State Aid Commission in Oregon outside of Multnomah county, is off the press and is available to all interested parties, according to Jerrold Owen, secretary to the commission.

Detailed information is given about the individual state-owned farms and no doubt there are a

number of the readers of The Gate City Journal who are interested in the purchase of farms and homes. The brochures are free for the asking and can be obtained by contacting Earl Blackaby of Ontario who is the Malheur county representative of the Commission, or by writing direct to the Salem office.

Compilers of the pamphlet have endeavored to condense the data as much as possible. Sale price range from \$125 for a Baker county holding to \$10,000 for a farm in Harney county, but the average, according to Sergeant Earl R. Goodwin, assistant secretary of the Commission, is approximately \$2515.

The Commission also has listings of city located holdings which are available to the public and every effort is being made to return the state-owned property to the tax rolls by placing it in the hands of responsible parties. Using Honey

Many prefer to can their fruits with honey. In canning apricots, peaches or pears use the following methods: First, cook fruits in the open kettle, then add from 1/4 to 1/2 cup of honey (or more if you like your fruit sweet) to each quart of fruit. Allow to boil from 3 to 5 minutes, skim and seal. Second: For the cold pack method make a syrup and pour over packed fruit, then process as usual. For a thin syrup

use 1 cup of honey for 3 cups of water; for medium, use 1 cup of honey to 2 cups of water; for a thick syrup use equal parts and for a very rich syrup use 2 cups of honey to 1 cup of water. Allow syrup to come to a rolling boil and skim and then fill jars of fruit.

Honey adds to the nourishment of cold drinks; makes them more delicious and cooling to the blood. Feed tea for hot days! Try sweetening it with honey while it is still hot, then set aside to cool. Add ice.

Fruit-Ade for Two

1/2 cup pineapple juice; 1/4 to 1/2 cup honey 2 cups water; Juice of 1 orange. Juice of 1 lemon. Mix juices and add honey and water. Strain and serve with ice.

Cold Milk Chocolate

1 cup cocoa, 2 cups honey (or 1c honey and 1 cup sugar); 2 cups hot water. Pour hot water slowly over cocoa to dissolve and then bring to a boil. Boil one minute, add honey and a pinch of salt and let just come to a boil again. When cool put in a glass jar and keep in refrigerator. One part of the syrup added to four or six parts of iced milk, beaten with an egg beater, make a very nourishing drink.
