The local ball team closed their league season Sunday with a close game played at Payette. The final score was 3 to 2 in favor of Payette; giving the Idaho team the right to play Boise for the championship of the second half of the split season. Boise also won their game, handing Emmett a 14 to 1 wallop.

The game Sunday at Payette was a pitchers duel between Dean Johnson of Nyssa and Boone Wilson and Rasmussen, moundsmen for Payette. Neither team scored until the fifth inning; although Nyssa filled the bases in the third but were unable to punch one across. Payette scored in the fifth and sixth and Nyssa scored in the seventh. In the first half of the eighth, with Rasmussen pitching, Roy Hashitani hit one for a home run with one on, tying the score. Payette scored the winning run in the last half of the eighth.

The Nyssa-Payette battle was followed by Payette playing the famous House of David team. The long-bearded baseball showmen put on an exhibition making the hardest plays look easy and won 12 to 5. Payette jumped into the lead in this game when Ray Brubaker and Chalfant hit homers in the same inning, but after their demonstration of the "pepper game" in fifth, the House of David boys almost tore the fence down with their murderous drives. Frank Rambaud of Nyssa pitched the latter part of this game.

Bass To Be Planted In Owyhee Waters

Another shipment of bass for planting purposes will be received in a few days, according to word from Matt Ryckman, superintendent, division of fisheries; to be used in stocking the Owyhee reservoir back of the dam. Two other shipments have already been planted in previous years.

The little fish to arrive here have been salvaged when the waters of the Willamette river fell, leaving thousands of the little fellows stranded in pot-holes above the water mark. A similar shipment will arrive for planting in the Warm Springs reservoir.

It is expected that by continually stocking the waters back of the dam, one of the finest bass fishing waters in the country will be developed. This will give the residents of this part of the country a chance to angle for game fish without having to travel so far to get to good fishing water.

Action Taken On Sewer Question

The city council passed a resolution Monday night in regular session, authorizing Don Graham, the mayor to file an application to the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works for a loan and grant to aid the financing the construction of a sewage disposal plant and sewer system and designating A. R. Miller, recorder and A. L. Fletcher, city attorney to furnish such information as the government may request.

The application authorized to be made was to be an amended application under the Act of 1935, requesting the allotment of funds for the project on the basis of 55 per cent loan and 45 per cent grant.

This step is the preliminary move toward getting a grant for a sewer. Before the formal application can be sent in, a plan of system as designated by Fred McConnell of Caldwell must be secured. Mr. McConnell has been working on the plans but they are not yet completed. Plans and specifications must be drawn, showing the design of the plant, the amount of labor to be employed, type of labor, utility of the system, financing details, legal aspects and other questions required by the government. It is the councils intention to file this application as soon as the plans are completed.

Preliminary plans as submitted by Mr. McConnell call for a simplified system estimated to cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000. Forty-five per cent of this would be an outright gift by the federal government and the balance of 55 per cent can be borrowed at the rate of 5 per cent interest.

MANY DRIVERS SHOULD

HAVE NEW LICENSES

Motorists in Oregon who applied for license renewal on or before July 1, but have not yet received new cards, or other response, are advised by the Oregon State Motor Association to communicate with the Secretary of State.

All applications sent in around the first of last month should have been acted upon by this time, it was pointed out, and if neither the card nor a letter has been received, the applicant should investigate.

At the end of July the motor vehicle operator's license division had made its way nearly to the bottom of the avalanche of renewals, the motor association announced. Out of 263,000 applications received, 247,000 have been acted upon.

Approximately 90,000 applications are still expected, as there was 357,000 licensed operators in the state subject to the renewal measure.
