Special Scales Weigh Beeves

The trailer scales being used in Eastern Oregon in weigh 4-H baby beef calves is scheduled for Malheur county on Saturday, August 10 to weigh the beef calves being fattened by the members of the Malheur Baby Beef Calf Club.

This trailer scales is unique in being the only one of its kind being used for this purpose in the United States, and it was donated to the 4-H Club department by the Congress Hotel in Portland to help club members in keeping accurate records in developing their project.

The scales make a circuit of Eastern Oregon counties once each month so that the club members have an opportunity of weighing their animals monthly and can keep an accurate record of the gains in weight their animals are making.

p. m. Clyde Boston, Cairo, 3 p. m. and Fred DeBoer, Ontario, Oregon, 3:30 p. m.

Anyone interested in seeing these scales in operation and seeing the calves weighed are invited to stop at any of the places.
