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**OSC TO ASSIST IN FEDERAL RANGE STOCK PROGRAM**

He will become professor of animal husbandry, with headquarters at the college. Recommended to succeed him as county agent in Grant county is R. E. Brooke, at present assistant county agent at Klamath county.

 "The State of Oregon has a definite responsibility in any program that will restore the millions of acres of public or semi-public lands to profitable productivity."  
 "I consider R. G. Johnson to be ideally fitted to head this new undertaking. He was raised on a cattle ranch and has ridden the range since he was 12 years old. After completing his course at Oregon State college he engaged in the cattle business with his father in Wasco county, but as a result of health conditions had to enter another line of work. His reputation as an outstanding range livestock authority extends throughout the northwestern states."  
 Mr. Brooke, who was recommended to succeed Johnson in Grant county, obtained his masters degree at O. S. C., and has since made an excellent record as assistant county agent, according to extension officials.
