NYSSA TO HAVE NEW BANK

This week we take great pleasure in announcing to our readers the fact that the great First National Bank of Portland is to open a branch in Nyssa. Every man, woman and child in the Nyssa section should be thrilled by the fact for it means that Nyssa is definitely headed for better days.

The First National has a reputation that is of the best, a sound financial institution with assets running into the millions. In other cities they have started branch banks, their loaning policy has been a great asset to the community. Such should be the case in Nyssa. Let us join in welcoming this institution to our community.

The decision to enter the local field did not come out of a clear sky. For months local business leaders have been working for a bank and when the bank opens November 2, it will be with great satisfaction they view the fruits of their labors. First National officials have thoroughly investigated the Nyssa section, believe in the future of our country, and we are glad to welcome them to Nyssa.

BOND ELECTION NOVEMBER 5

Another milestone in the progress of Nyssa was recorded this week with the setting of Tuesday, November 5 as the date for the bond election to authorize the issuance of \$13,200 in bonds to cooperate with the federal government in building a sewer for Nyssa.

The city council has worked out a scale of charges for various types of services, making it more economical to be on the sewer line and at the same time making it possible to have the main sewer line built with practically no increase in taxes to the city taxpayers. The federal government pay 45 per cent of the cost, if this grant is secured, and Nyssa pays 55 per cent of the cost. If Nyssa votes the bonds, it is believed that little difficulty will be experienced in securing the federal grant; cutting the cost of installing a sewer at this time practically in half.

NEW CAPITOL SITE QUESTION

The war in Ethiopia is not the only battle going on at the present time. Right here in Oregon we have a big fight based on the question, "Shall Oregon build its new capitol on the old site or get a new one." The battle is being carried on in the legislature this week and was preceded with reams of publicity pro and con.

We have often wondered why the Idaho capitol site was never mentioned in the reams of publicity being sent to the newspapers. We learn that Arkansas has a 43.08 acre site; California one of 40.2 acres; Kentucky a 40 acre site and so on and on. We read that the Oregon capitol grounds has 5.25 acres and that the Willson Park on the west is composed of 6 acres. We also find that the Oregon Supreme Court and state offices occupies 1.94 acres on a separate site and that the Agricultural Building occupies .34 acres. Now we think we have found out why the Idaho site is never mentioned. It only occupies 3.46 acres and the powers that be are trying, oh so hard, to get public opinion behind a demand for a larger site for Oregon's new capitol.

According to the 1930 census, Oregon has a population of 953,786. In comparing Oregon and its capitol grounds of 5.25 acres with other states, among other things the size of the state should be taken into consideration. Connecticut we find with a population of 1,606,903, has a capitol site of 1.28 acres. Florida has a population of 1,468,211 and its capitol site covers 3.67 acres. The population of Georgia is 2,908,506 and has a capitol site of 4.6 acres. Nevada gets along with one acre, Wyoming with four, New Hampshire with three, and Tennessee with five. The state of New York as a 25 million dollar capitol built on a 10.73 acre piece of land.

The question the legislature must decide is whether Oregon's site of 5.25 acres is large enough for the new building to replace the one destroyed by fire last spring. Naturally Oregon is not building for this year nor next year; nor even for ten years from now. Oregon must build to take in considerations the needs of years to come. However the legislators must take into

consideration that Oregon taxpayers will object strenuously to being saddled with any unnecessary expense and if the old site can be used, that is the thing to do.
