Using Honey

Honey With Vegetables

A little honey will improve the flavor of certain vegetables. Just try the following recipes:

Squash Cups with Peas

4 cups hot mashed squash. 1 teaspoon salt. 4 tablespoons honey. 2 tablespoons butter. Pinch of baking powder.

Mix ingredients thoroughly. Place a scoop of the mixture on a dinner plate. Make a cavity in top and fill with hot peas to which has been added butter, salt and one teaspoon of honey to each cup of peas.

Honey Buttered Beets

2½ cups cooked diced beets. 1½ cups cornstarch. 1½ cups beet juice. 1 T lemon juice. 2 T vinegar. 1½ cups cornstarch. 2 salt. 1 T butter 3T honey. Let beets and beet juice come to a boil. Mix cornstarch and honey to form a smooth paste. Add remaining ingredients mix well and add to beets. Simmer 5 minutes.

Tomato Juice Cocktail

2c tomato juice. 4T lemon juice. 2t honey. ¼ t salt. Mix the ingredients thoroughly and chill and serve.
