BEARS ON TOP, MEET HUSKIES

Blue and Gold Only Unbeaten Team On Coast

One of eleven unbeaten, untied teams in the nation, the Golden Bears of the University of California find themselves on top of the Pacific Coast Conference heap this week with the Huskies of Washington and the Cardinals of Stanford still standing grimly between them and the conference championship, and the Rose Bowl.

The Bears continued their forward march last week by handing their little brothers, the Bruins of U. C. L. A. their first defeat of the season, thus practically eliminating the southerners as title threats. A well-executed forward pass and a blocked kick accounted for the Bear touchdowns. The Bruins received their two points when Don Fowler elected to run a kick back from behind his goal line and was nailed for a safety.

Close on the Bears' trail, with only one conference defeat chalked against their records, are the Huskies, the Cards, and, of course, the Bruins. But whereas Washington and Stanford each have an opportunity to knock over the Blue and Gold warriors, and thus win the Rose Bowl assignment, the Bruins cannot improve their record. Idaho is the only conference opponent remaining on the U. C. L. A. schedule. This week-end, California meets Washington at the Berkeley stadium, and, as usual, Bear Coach "Sub" Allison predicts defeat for his team. The Huskies took Montana into camp, 33 to 7, last Saturday and undoubtedly will provide stiff opposition for the tired Californians, who are in the midst of

a tough stretch that began on October 5th and have not had a breather since.

Stanford called on Jim "Monk" Moscrip's powerful right foot again last week, and his field goal in the final quarter gave the Cards a 9 to 6 victory over a hard-driving Santa Clara team that kept the speedy Cardinal backs, including All-American Candidate Bobby Grayson, bottled up most of the afternoon.

"Tiny" Thornhill takes his charges to Los Angeles this week, to meet the Trojans of U. S. C., who have not chalked up many wins this season but who still know how to fight.

The Coast will see some other good games this week, although none but the California-Washington contest have conference bearing. Oregon and Oregon State have their "big game" at Eugene and a close contest is predicted. The Oregon Seters beat Portland U. 19 to 2 last Saturday while the Webfeet took a day off. Washington State, beaten Saturday by Gonzaga, meets Idaho at Moscow. On Armistice Day, Monday, U. C. L. A. will be host to the colorful and unbeaten Southern Methodist eleven. In New York, St. Mary's meets Fordham in their annual game.
