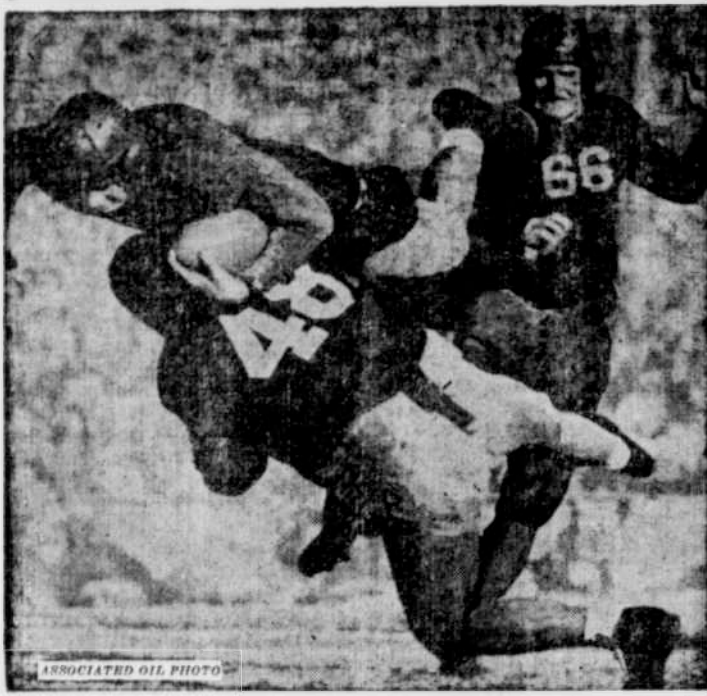

**BEARS CONTINUE WINNING STREAK**

"Can They Be Stopped?" Washington U. Added To List Of Victims

"Can anybody stop those Bears?" is the question Pacific Coast football fans are asking this week. The Bears themselves answered the question with a confident "no" the very first week of the season, and they have added emphasis to that declaration each succeeding Saturday.  
Now only their arch-rivals, the Stanford Cardinals, stand between them and the Rose Bowl on New Year's Day.

**To Pasadena!**  
The "Big Game," always just that to ardent followers of the Cardinals and the Line and Gold, is the big game to the whole Coast this year. In the huge Bowl at Palo Alto on November 23rd probably will be decided the Western representative for the Pasadena classic. Mathematically, the Coast Conference title can be all tied up by a Stanford victory. The Cards, U. C. L. A. and Washington State have single defeats on their records thus far.

The Bears rose to their peak form in defeating Washington last Saturday. California stopped the Husky attack, and the Huskies couldn't halt the Bear's aerial offense. The scoreboard read 14 to 0 at the end of a grand game.

**Moscrip Helpful**  
Stanford almost pulled a cropper, but Jim "Monk" Moscrip won another game for the Cards when his right toe propelled the ball through the goal posts in the final 30 seconds of the game with U. S. C. Score, 3 to 0—the third Stanford victory in three successive weeks to be credited to Moscrip's place-kicking. He will be a real threat against California anytime the Cards get within shooting distance of the goal posts. This week is "breather week" for

both Big Game participants. California meets College of the Pacific, and Stanford clashes with Montana. Neither team, however, can pause too long for breath against these opponents. "Breathers" have a way of knocking the wind out of the big fellows every so often. Pacific scared the Bears last year, losing 6 to 7.

**Oregon Wins**  
Oregon, having defeated its chief rival, Oregon State, 13 to 0, has Portland U. as an opponent this week, with Washington waiting on the following Saturday. The Staters meet Idaho.

San Francisco's "Little Big Game," bringing together St. Mary's and Santa Clara, comes up on Sunday. This always fills Kezar Stadium, and both teams usually play their best ball of the season. St. Mary's and Fordham played to a 7 to 7 tie in New York last Saturday.
