"Tear-Drop" Test Car Stops
Briefly in Nyssa Monday Noon

A "tear-drop" test car stopped briefly in Nyssa at the Powell Service station Monday noon, piloted by W. A. Bartlett, test engineer of St. Louis and J. W. Broubay of the Salt Lake Hardware Company. The car drew considerable attraction, and the operators were called upon to answer many questions. The purpose of the car is to test motor performance on the road the driver said, and the car is equipped with many delicate instruments to check

motor car performance. Several of these cars have been put on the road by the McQuay-Norris company, each a different type, in an effort to discover the relative efficiency of various body types. The car which stopped at Nyssa was a V-8 Ford with a "tear-drop" body built around it. The front end is built of shatter-proof flexible glass and the entire design is built with the elimination of wind resistance in mind.

Using Honey

Many requests come to us at Christmas time for helpful candies, made with honey, so we print some good ones.

Honey Caramels

2 cups honey, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup evaporated milk, ½ cup butter, few grains salt.

Cook sugar, honey, salt rapidly to firm ball stage (250 degrees). Stir occasionally. Add butter and milk gradually so the mixture does not stop boiling at any time. Cook rapidly to firm ball stage (252 degrees). Stir constantly so mixture will not stick. our into buttered pan, cool thoroughly before cutting into squares. Wrap individually in oiled paper.

Honey Taffy

2 cups honey, 2 cups sugar, 2-3 cup cold water, ¼ teaspoon salt.

Boil the water, honey and sugar to hard ball stage (288 degrees). Add salt. Put on buttered dish, cool then pull. Cut and wrap.

Honey Lollipops

¼ cup dried prunes, ¼ cup dried apricots, ¼ cup dried figs, ¼ cup dates, 1-3 cup honey, ¼ cup raisins, ¼ teaspoon salt.

Let dried prunes and apricots stand in boiling water for five minutes, drain. Grind all fruit in food chopper using medium course knife. Add honey and salt. Mold into balls. Roll in chopped nuts, cocoanuts or dip in melted fondant or chocolate. May be put on sticks for lollipops, wrap in cellophane or waxed paper.

Honey Divinity

¼ cup sugar, 1-3 cup water; 1-3 cup honey, 2 egg white, pinch of salt.

Boil together the sugar, honey and water until the syrup spins a thread when dropped from a spoon (about 250 degrees). Pour the syrup over the well beaten whites of the eggs, beating continuously and until the mixture crystallizes. Drop in small pieces on waxed paper. One cup nut meats may be added.

Honey Fudge

2½ cups sugar, 1½ cups chocolate cut fine; ¼ cup honey, 1 cup rich milk or cream; 1 cup nut meats.

Cook until it forms a firm ball in cold water. Take from the fire, cool and beat until creamy and ready to harden. Add nuts, pour on buttered plate, mark in squares.

Honey Popcorn Balls

3-4 cup honey; 3-4 cup sugar; ¼ cup water; 1 teaspoon salt, 3 quarts of popcorn or 2 packages of rice krispies may be used.

Cook sugar, salt and water (stir until sugar is dissolved) to very brittle stage (300 degrees). Add honey slowly, stirring until blended. Cook again until the thermometer registers 240 degrees or about one minute. Pour over popcorn and form into balls. Wrap in heavy waxed paper.

Honeyed Fruit Stubs

Orange peel, honey, salt, water. Remove peel from 3 oranges, cut peel in strips. Cover with water to which 1 teaspoon of salt has been added. Boil 30 minutes, drain, cover with fresh water, boil until tender. Drain add honey enough to cover from 3-4 to 1 cup. Let simmer very slowly until peel is clear, about 45 minutes. Lay on waxed paper and let stand 2 or 3 days before using.

Variations: Grapefruit peel and lemon peel may be similarly prepared. Fruit strips may be rolled in cocoanut or nuts.

Peel may be coated with confectioner's chocolate.

Peel may be chopped and used in cookies, nut bread or muffin mixtures.
