SENTIMENT ALL AGAINST SALES TAX FOR OREGON—

The Oregon Business and Investors, an organization of conservative business men, property owners, investors—a group who could reasonably be expected to favor a true sales tax as a means of broadening the lop-sided tax base in Oregon; this organization was 53 per cent opposed to the proposed Oregon sales tax. Their opinion was solicited by means of a questionnaire on the sales tax and shows pretty definitely which way the wind is blowing.

The editors of Oregon were polled and out of 50 replies 43 opposed and 7 favored the tax. A poll taken by a retail merchants organization showed heavy opposition. Townsend pension clubs are believed to be generally opposed, while the Grange and labor forces are stirred up in opposition.

With all this opposition, it seems hard to believe that the tax will pass, but we must not be lulled into security. It is important that everyone qualified should vote in the election January 31st. If the sales tax goes over it will not be the first time a minority have put over their wishes, simply because the rank and file neglected to cast their ballots.

OPINIONS BY OUR READERS

The American government has meddled plenty with industry in the past few years but never so thoroughly and stupidly as it has meddled with farming. There are plenty of competent farmers in this country. But there are too many of the other kind, and federal meddling is partly to blame for them. It has tried to save him from the consequences of his own bad management. And the dumber he is, the more the government fusses about him.

The Potato Control Act may not be the last word in governmental meddling with the farmer, but is certainly the reduction of absurdity of the bountiful but dumb policy towards the farmer. Fundamental farming consists of sticking a seed potato in the ground and waiting for it to grow and multiply, unless the bugs and worms get there first. Potato farming in the modern manner means licenses and quotas, inspectors and price-fixers, standard packages and managed marketing, fines and penalties, prohibiting and bootlegging, and thousands of government employees trying to make the system work. If it doesn't work, the government invents more laws, hires more men and spends more money to make it work. This is what happened to our lowly spud, when it became an economic and political problem. Is it going to happen, in turn, to everything that grows on the farm. Or will the government by experience learn to mind its own business.

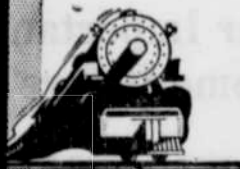
