GEOGRAPHY'S HIGH AND LOW IN SIGHT FROM SAME SPOT



HOW HIGH IS UP? The ancient stage wheeze comes to life when one stands at "Bad Water" on the floor of Death Valley, California, 276 feet below sea level, and looks off on a clear day to the northwest where Mt. Whitney, king of the Sierra Nevada Mountains, rears his snowy head, 14,501 feet above sea level. The two points, the lowest and the highest in continental United States, are within sight of each other. Death Valley, one of the world's most dramatic spectacles, available to tourist travel only in the winter months, was designated a National Monument by Congress in February, 1933.

OBSERVATIONS By Other Editors

A STAGGERING BLOW

The United States supreme courts anti-AAA decision turns out the nation's agricultural program. It re-admits unleased speculation in life's necessities. The decision was no sooner announced than speculative stock exchange trading soared.

The supreme court's decision strikes a stunning blow at measures that have advanced farm recovery. The Agricultural Adjustment Administration has been the one thing that saved American farmers from beggary and destitution.

One possible ray of light is that farm organizations, aided by the farmers' strengthened financial position, may battle through.

It is intimated that the only corrective is a constitutional amendment. This may be premature conclusion. There has been expectancy for weeks that the supreme court would follow other precedents and outlaw AAA as invasion of the "re-

served rights of the states." Measures protective and defensive to farmers may still be within reach. If so, proposal will soon be before congress.

It was a 6-to-3 decision by the supreme court. The "reactionary six" are Chief Justice Hughes and Justices Roberts (who read the decision), Butler, Van Devanter, McReynolds and Sutherland.

Swept away by the anti-New Deal decision is the whole structure of AAA crop control and regulation. With it went the Jones-Costigan sugar control act, the Bankhead cotton act, the Kerr-Smith cotton act and the potato control law.

Invalidated are the processing taxes. From some other source, perhaps taxation, it appears to be necessary to raise \$602,000,000 pledged to the farmers. Some \$300,000,000 impounded in federal court awaiting the decision may also be lost.

The supreme court has frowned upon the whole plan by which the farm prices in America increased nearly \$3,000,000,000 in a brief 2 1/2 years under the New Deal.

And, in the meantime, the United States supreme court establishes itself as the super-government of the United States.

Not even the people can have their way if the way conflicts with a construction that takes into account the letter but not the spirit of the constitution.

For the constitution contains a



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welfare clause that the "reactionary six" of the United States supreme court utterly disregarded.

And if the AAA was not national welfare, with its increased buying power for the farmers, and increased prosperity from that increased buying power for the cities, what was it? And if the "welfare" clause is not in the constitution for "national welfare," what is it there for?

The following familiar names are in all supreme court decisions in which the reactionaries of New York and New England are served and the great mass of citizens discriminated against: Justices Roberts, Butler, Van Devanter, McReynolds and Sutherland.

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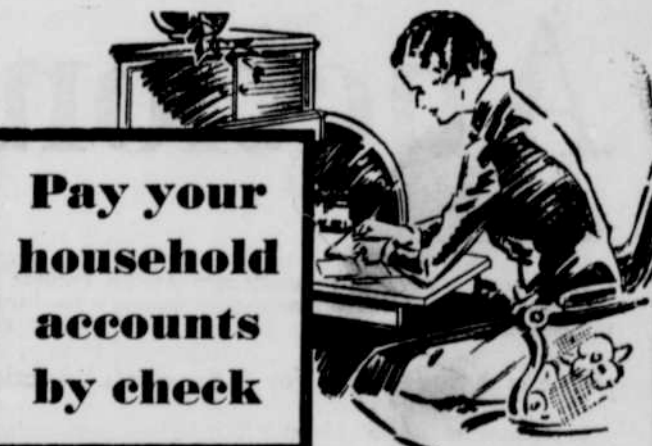


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
