## TYPIST

Typing I students have been taking ten-minute speed and accuracy tests regularly twice a week.

Several of the students have typed accurately at the rate of 30 to 33 words a minute on these tests.

The requirement for first semester typing is a rate of 15 words a minute on 10-minute speed tests with 5 or less errors.

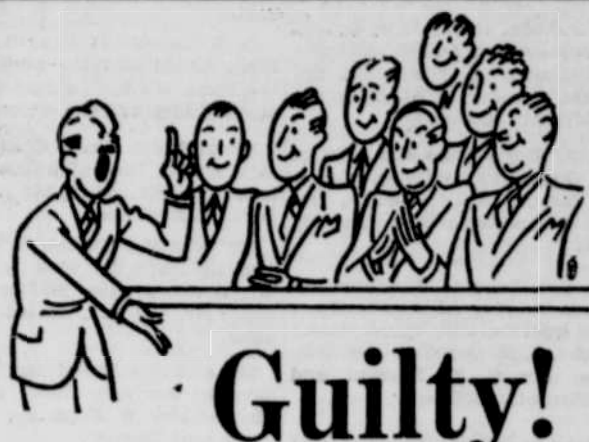
