Only one hunter in the U. S. Biological Survey got more coyotes in December than Robert E. Long of Malheur county according to a report issued this week. Long got 19 coyotes and one bobcat during the month and was beaten only by A. B. Richey of Klamath who brought down 23 coyotes but failed to get any bobcats.

In the whole state 354 coyotes and 23 bobcats were taken by hunters working for the biological survey.

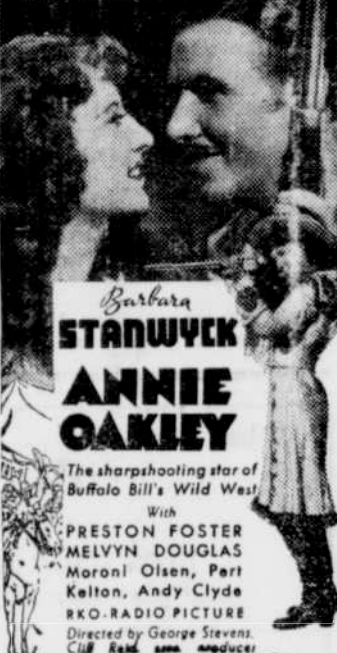
