

AAA WORK AT A STANDSTILL IN MALHEUR COUNTY

The decision of the United States Supreme Court in early January stopped all work in connection with the various adjustment programs. In Malheur County this means the Corn-Hog Control, Wheat Production Control and the Potato Control. Along with this stoppage of the Control programs, processing taxes also were stopped, which leaves the AAA facing the problem of paying obligations already incurred, with no source of revenue out of which to make payments. It is the understanding and belief, however, that all payments on contracts which have been completed will eventually be made. The processing tax of thirty cents per bushel on wheat and the tax of two dollars and twenty five cents per hundred pounds of live weight on hogs now being discontinued, it remains to be seen how this will effect the prices received by producers and prices paid by consumers.

The Potato Control Act, while not a part of the Agricultural Adjustment Act, is being held up pending further information from Washington. No doubt, there will be some other type of farm legislation to take the place of the Agricultural Adjustment Act, but no one knows

CAN APPLY FOR GOVERNMENT TEST ON CATTLE HERDS

The Bangs Disease Control program has been in operation now for almost a year in this county. During this time approximately five thousand head of cattle have been tested. The percentage of reactors being in the neighborhood of eleven per cent. Thus far, the principal work has been among dairy cattle, although any cattle owner within the county is eligible to apply for this test. Bangs Disease, or what was formerly known as Contagious Abortion, is just as likely to be found among beef cattle as dairy. Usually, however, the control among beef cattle is not nearly so difficult. Additional assistance is available now in Malheur County for carrying on this test, at the earliest possible date. The principal features in connection with this program are as follows: The cattle owner makes application on blanks which can be secured at the County Agent's office. On this application, the owner agrees that he will permit testing of his herd, of all females over six months of age and bulls, and that he will continue testing his herd until they are eligible for accreditation under the state plan. The state plan now calls for two clean tests of the herd, before accreditation can be made. The government agrees to provide as many tests free of charge as is necessary to accomplish this, providing the number of tests does not exceed four. After the fourth test, if additional tests are necessary, the owner agrees to do the testing at his own expense. The owner agrees that all reacting animals will be disposed of within a reasonable length of time for slaughter purposes and the government agrees to pay an indemnity on reactors not to exceed twenty-five dollars per head for grade females and fifty dollars per head for the purebred females, upon proof of disposal for slaughter. This twenty-five dollar indemnity is in addition to what the animal will bring for meat, provided the meat value and the indemnity do not exceed the appraisal price.

The above are just a few of the high lights in connection with the agreement. Full details are given on the application which as stated, can be secured at the County Agent's office and shall be filed with the County Agent as soon as made out. If you want this test, you should apply now.

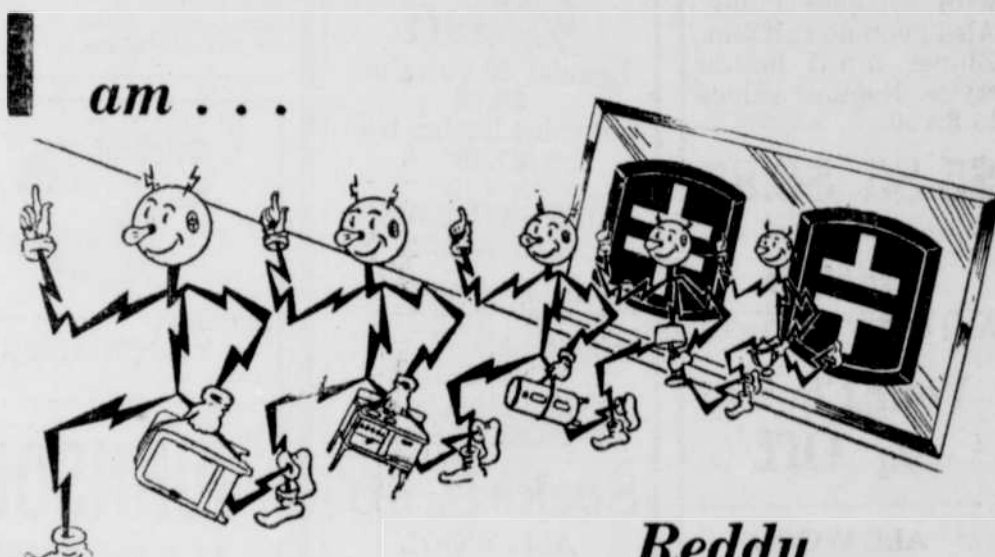
