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WILD LIFE LEAGUE GETS AWAY TO GOOD START—

A forward step in the protection and fostering of fish and game in Malheur county was made Tuesday night when the Nyssa Wild Life League was organized. Some 40 sportsmen have already joined the organization and it is hoped that this will be increased to at least 100 in the next few weeks.

When a section of the county is unrepresented by a fish and game league, the usual thing is that part of the state gets but little attention. This is only natural and is no reflection on the commission. The gentlemen comprising the commission are conscientious and are working for the best interests of fish and game in Oregon. If an organized group from some section suggests changes; naturally they get some consideration. Nyssa now has an organized group that can have some voice in fish and game matters of this section. It is quite likely that the local organization will join in a county council to work out matters of interest to the county as a whole.

The need for more interest in game matters is astounding. For example in the case of migratory water fowl. Last year there were but 284,000 duck stamps sold whereas a year before there were 630,000 sold. The ducks are disappearing at an alarming rate and it is to the interest of hunters that this condition be checked.

On the other hand antelope are increasing at a rapid rate. They are protected and it is estimated that there are at least 10,000 of the animals in Malheur county. While they are not a great hindrance to stockmen at present, the time is coming when the season will probably be opened on them, at least for a short period.

The opening and closing seasons, bag limit, closing and opening of fishing streams, planting of fish and birds, discouraging of poaching and breaking of the law, improving fishing and hunting facilities—these and dozens of other questions are matters of interest to sportsmen and can best be handled through such an organization as has been started in Nyssa.

A. P. Cunningham of Rockville says the snow in his part of the county was the heaviest in years and that the ground will be thoroughly soaked with moisture when the snow finally disappears, which won't be long now.
