Homes and Gardens

Last fall I was talking to a lady who has a small patch of wild morning glory in her garden. Since that time I have information for killing it without spraying. F. M. Gill (Oregon) says, a treatment that destroys morning glory without injury to the soil is as follows: Put down holes with a half inch iron rod, 20 to 24 inches deep and 30 inches apart each way. Into each hole pour three fluid ounces of carbon disulphide and fill top of hole with dirt. This treatment should spread three feet beyond the present spread of the plant. It will kill every living thing in the soil, but will not kill seeds. In two weeks the soil is ready to use again.

Carbon disulphide is as inflammable as explosive as gasoline. so keep it away from fires. When it is used in the soil, the soil should be damp enough to plow well. This treatment might be cheaper for a small patches of the weed than spraying. It will all depend on how expensive the carbon disulphide is. There is plenty of time to try this and still plant a garden on this spot this spring as it does not kill the morning glory seeds. You would have to watch out for any that

would come up and destroy them immediately or your work would be to do over again next year. I wish if anyone tries this, they would report the results to either the Journal or myself.

Here is the other recipe I promised last week. I make this myself and it is delicious. It would be ideal for a bridge party or any other party where candy is used. The credit for the original recipe goes to the lady who's name is at the end of this column.

PINEAPPLE-CREAM SQUARES

3 cupsful of sugar; 1 cupful of crushed pineapple (juice and pulp); 2 tablespoonsful of white syrup; 2 teaspoonful of butter; 24 marshmallows; 3 cupsful of pecans; 1 teaspoonful of vanilla.

Mix the sugar, pineapple and syrup in a heavy saucepan and cook, stirring constantly until a soft ball forms when dropped in cold water (236 degrees). Remove from the stove and add butter, marshmallows, pecans and vanilla. Beat until creamy and very stiff. Pour into a buttered pan and cut into squares when firm.—Mrs. M. A. More, Indianapolis, Mississippi.

NOTICE HEREBY IS GIVEN, That an election will be held in the Owyhee Irrigation District, in Malheur County, Oregon, on the 25th day of April, 1936, for the purpose of authorizing the Board of Directors of said District to negotiate and execute a supplemental contract with the United States of America, the Payette-Oregon Slope Irrigation District, the Kingman Kolony Irrigation District, the Slide Irrigation District, the Gem Irrigation District, the Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation District, the Bench Irrigation District, the Crystal Irrigation District, and the Advancement Irrigation District, amending and altering the terms and conditions of the original contract of said Owyhee Irrigation District with the United States of America, of date of October 14, 1926, and providing for a supplemental water supply for certain lands of the Owyhee Project, fixing construction and water rental payments for a term of years, the expenditure by the United States of America of a sum not to exceed \$15.00 per irrigable acre within certain Districts, and providing for the repayment of the same.

tract substantially in the form as approved by the Secretary of the Interior and submitted to the Board of Directors is on file in the office of the Secretary of the Owyhee Irrigation District, at Nyssa, Oregon, and may be inspected by all interested persons during business hours.

Said election will be held between the hours of 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon and 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon of said 25th day of April, 1936, when the polls shall be closed.

The Board of Directors has designated the South half of the Southeast quarter of the Northeast quarter of Section 26, in Township 19, South of Range 46 E. W. M. in Malheur County, State of Oregon, within said District, as the place where said election shall be held.
