Beth Anna Markham is ill.

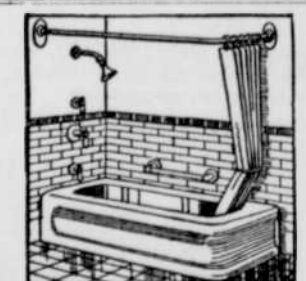
