

ANNUAL REPORT OF KOLONY PTA SHOWS ACTIVITY

"The Relation of the Home to Character Formation," is the theme of the National Congress of Parent and Teachers in May. The study in the Kolony P. T. A. during the past seven months has followed this theme rather closely. The home and its responsibility has proved to be a subject to induce a participating membership. Part of this may be due to the fact that the National Parent Teacher magazine is going into nearly every home.

More than usual interest has been shown in International Relations. Interesting discussion about peace education have been stimulated by letters which have been received from Peaceways.

To open each meeting the children under the direction of the teachers have entertained for a few minutes. This has not been done by exploiting the individual child but by groups giving a sample of their school work such as dramatized reading, music and debate.

A teachers reception and Hal-loween party afforded two pleasant evenings and interested many new families.

A legislative meeting was held one evening just prior to election. Mr. Carl Coad of Nyssa explained the state measures and Mr. Wylie Hewitt told of the national meetings.

A Founders' Day candle lighting ceremony and little playettes helped to focus the attention upon the ideal of the Founders and brought out the fact that the Kolony P. T. A. has been in continuous service for twenty years.

The unit helped with the Christmas entertainment by providing the treat and costumes.

Assistance was given the hot lunch project by helping to pay for the cooking and serving of the lunch for 75 children.

The Unit has sponsored 4-H club work and until 1936 has provided funds to send two 4-H members to summer school. The club members are raising the money themselves this year.

P. T. A. has also sponsored Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts although both organization have always been self supporting.

Means of raising funds have been a pie supper following the legislative program, four benefit parties given by members; a food sale and a small rummage sale.

Much of the success of the year of study and service has been due to the untiring efforts of the president, the splendid cooperation of the teachers and the interest of 39 members. The officers and chairmen dur-

ing the year have been, Mrs. C. C. Cotton, president; Mrs. Maurice Judd and Wylie Hewitt, vice presidents; Mrs. Charles Newbill, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. D. C. Duval, membership; Mrs. R. R. Overstreet ways and means and hospitality; Mrs. Conrad Martin, magazine; Mr. Hewitt, legislative; Mrs. Wm. Toombs, social; Mrs. C. E. Elliott, 4-H club and summer round-up; Mrs. James Lane, program and resolutions; Mrs. Maurice Judd, International Relations and publicity.

The work for the next two months aside from the regular meetings will include the Summer Round-up when a doctor and dentist will examine all children who will enter school in the fall.

The unit will help the teachers with the County Play Day and will entertain with a picnic on the last day of school.

Probably the last activity of the spring will be in June when the Kolony will be the hostess unit, for the annual commencement exercises for the eight grade graduates from the five surrounding communities.

Two More Candidates Out For County Commissioner Job

E. H. Brumbach, present county commissioner, has decided to enter the race for the Democratic nomination and filed his name last week.

Mr. Brumbach is finishing his fourth year as commissioner of this county and also has a long record back of him in public service on the Riverside Canal board, going back to 1903 and has served on his school board for several terms. He has also been a director of the Parma Telephone Company since 1905.

Mr. Brumbach hales from Illinois, where he first saw the light of day on July 11, 1869, at Marseilles, Ill. He came to Malheur county, buying a farm in the Big Bend section in 1902 and has created one of the finest farms in this section from raw land. He is married and has four children, Joe Brumbach, one of the boys, is a contractor on the Owyhee project; Rex, a former superintendent of the Vale schools is now working with a harvester company out of Walla Walla, Wash., while the youngest boy, Ezra is at home. His daughter, Mrs. Fred Nightingale, is a teacher in the Ironside school.

L. P. "PETE" PETERSON

Another Republican candidate for commissioner has announced his intention of making the race, L. P. "Pete" Peterson of Vale. "Pete" as he is generally known, has lived in the county for 28 years, five of them on a ranch. At the present time he is engaged in the bee business.

Mr. Peterson was a charter member and first master of the Vale Grange and is an officer in the Malheur Pomona at this time. He served as a member of the Vale school board for six years and is an active member of the Vale fire department. Among his affiliations is a membership in the Odd Fellows Lodge, and he is chairman of the entertainment committee of the Malheur county Pioneers association.
