

YOUTH MOVEMENT DISCUSSED AT PTA COUNTY COUNCIL

The Youth Movement was discussed by Dean Frank Rhea of Boise at the annual County Council of Parents and Teachers Saturday at the Wade School. A large crowd attended the session.

"The churches and schools are failing in their duties to youths," Dean Rhea pointed out. "Of all the functions of the schools, that which seeks to aid youth in discovering their own capacities, interests and distastes, powers and weaknesses, is the most important to youths," Dean Rhea said. Mr. Rhea believes that youth must develop their best instincts by encouraging self-expression, and by furnishing opportunities to see life as it is and to

live it in school as it must be lived out of school.

Mrs. Frank Miller presented piano solos and pupils of the Wade school gave folk dances. Group singing was enjoyed.

SPECIAL FARM LOAN CONFERENCE CALLED

All national farm loan association members of Malheur county are invited to attend a special stockholders' meeting at Payette, May 2, it is announced by H. J. Davis, secretary-treasurer of the Payette NFILA who is making the local arrangements. The meeting will open at 1:30 in the Payette County courthouse.

"This informal assembly will be of vital interest to all farmers who own NFILA voting capital stock and who thereby have an indirect ownership interest in the Land bank of Spokane," Mr. Davis points out.

"The purpose is to give local stockholding member-borrowers a full explanation of the program for decentralizing the district Land Bank's operations, rebuilding this cooperative mortgage system around the local associations and revitalizing the principal of farmer ownership and farm control.

"Officials of the bank will be present to discuss this program fully and give members complete information about current operations. It is hoped that all members will attend and take an active part in the meeting, because this is a splendid opportunity to get questions answered and develop a bond of better understanding between the local associations and the district bank. A good part of the session will be devoted to informal round-table discussion."

A representative of the production credit division of the farm credit administration will also be present to explain how seasonal crop and livestock loans are made through the local cooperative production credit associations. All farmers and others interested in the cooperative method of farm financing are invited to "sit in" at the meeting.

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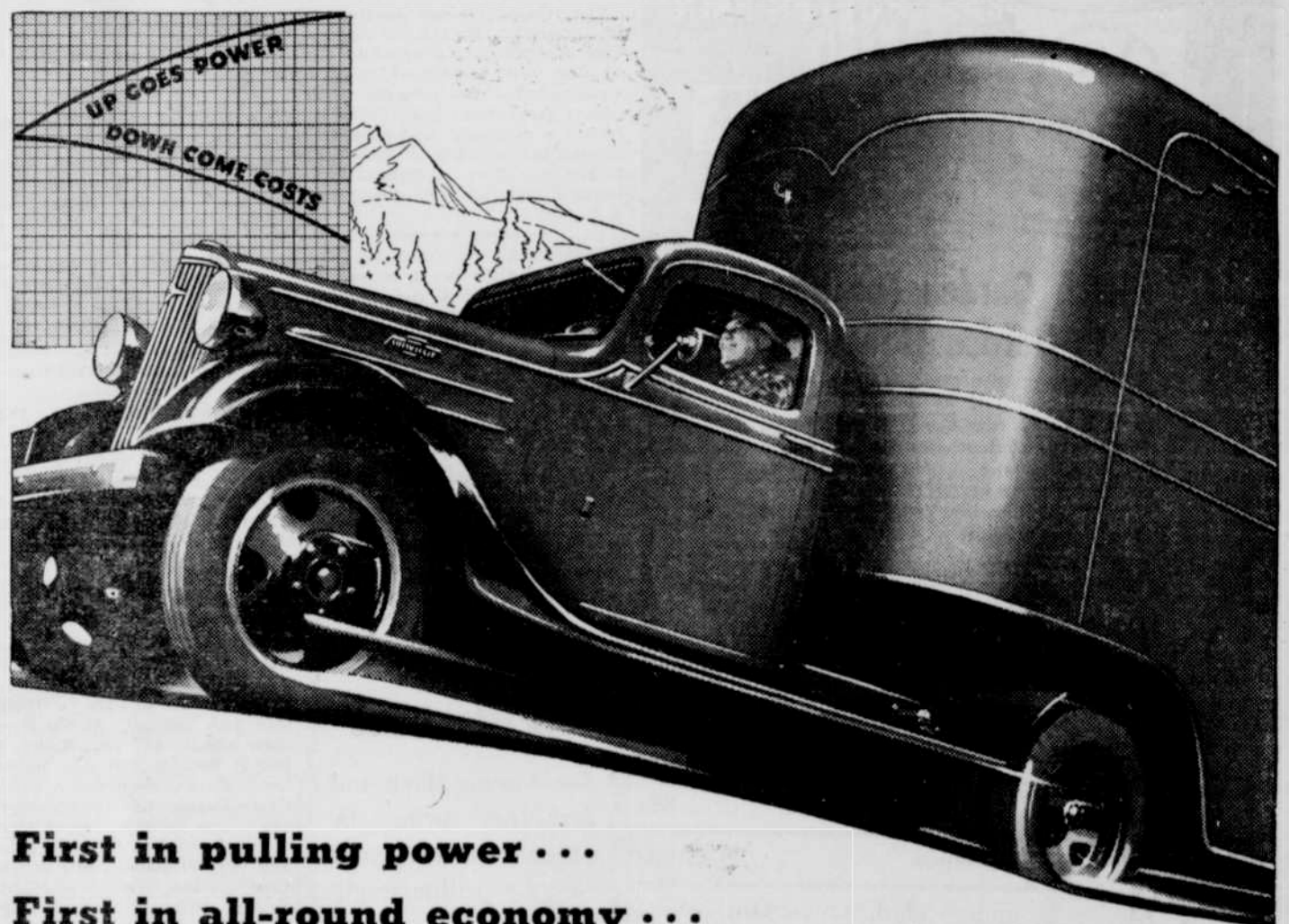
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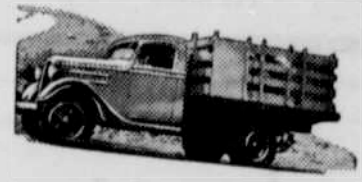
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
