Wilder Students
Hurt In Accident

Four seniors in the Wilder high school went to the hospital Monday suffering from injuries, perhaps serious, suffered when their car crashed into the side of a freight train at Weiser. The students were on their annual "sneak" day and four of the six in the car were badly hurt.

The accident happened at 4:45 in the morning just the other side of the Snake river bridge as the highway enters Weiser. The driver evidently failed to see the moving freight train.

Those hurt were George Lindsay, most seriously injured of the four, who is in the Caldwell hospital with a fractured skull. Two girls, June McConnel and Esther Breshears, sustained bone fractures while Mike Dunagan was cut about head but was believed to have no fractures. Merrill Dean, the driver of the car and Ray Julian, the sixth occupant of the car, escaped injury.

The "sneak" which had been started early in the morning long before classes were scheduled to convene, came to an abrupt halt with the accident and the students returned sorrowfully to their homes.
