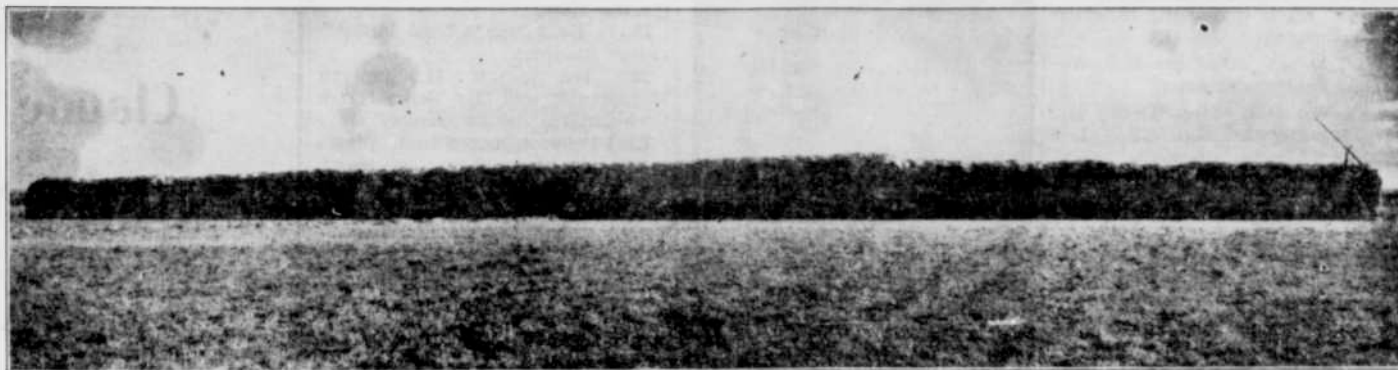
I have tried to do what was best right along. I may have failed at times, but it was not for want of trying.

You will have to admit this is an unusual haystack! It was the 1928 crop from 91 acres and was put up by C. P. Overstreet, three miles north and a half mile west of Nyssa. The stack is 665 feet long and measured 660 tons. Just think of it, the yield was 7.25 tons to the acre. While this is a good yield of hay, there have been many fields to beat this average around Nyssa. All farm crops do well around Nyssa. This is due to the combination of rich soil, ample water and plenty of sunshine. Feed which can be produced cheaply; mild, healthful climate and a long grazing season makes this a great livestock producing section. No dry seasons, no sand storms; sure crops every year is the experience of farmers on the Owyhee Project.

CIVIC SERVICE COMMISSION WARNS AGAINST MISLEADING INFORMATION

Washington, D. C. May 7.—The United States Civil Service Commission has sent a notice to post offices, warning that misleading information is being given the public by representatives of some of the correspondence schools which sell "civil service" courses.

For a long time, the Commission has been receiving complaints from different parts of the country which indicate that opportunities for obtaining Federal employment have been greatly exaggerated.

It was made clear that no school has any connection whatever with the Civil Service Commission or with any other branch of the Government, and also that the Commission has no agents who solicit applications for civil service positions or who "sell service" courses.

No school can "guarantee" Government employment and none is given information regarding examinations or any other information, which is not available to the general public. The Commission stated that it does not recommend any school, and explained that it is not necessary for anyone to take a course with a so-called civil service school in order to compete in a civil service examination.

A special point was made of the fact that information concerning examinations may be obtained at any time, without cost, from the Secretary of the Civil Service Board at any first or second class post office or from the Commission's office in Washington D. C.
