NICHOLS GIRL DIES WHILE BROKEN ARM IS BEING ATTENDED

Death descended suddenly on the Otis Nichols family Tuesday, taking away little Minnie Arratie Nichols, aged 9 years, 11 months and a day. Minnie was visiting at the home of her sister Mrs. Kenneth Green at the Sleep orchard north of Nyssa. About four o'clock Tuesday afternoon she fell a short distance out of a tree while playing with some companions, breaking her arm quite badly. She was taken to Ontario to have the arm set and died while under the anesthetic.

The sudden death was a distinct shock to the family, who live in Rockville, and to the friends of the family. Minnie had only been visiting with her sister since school was out last Friday and had just passed the fifth grade.

She was born at Harrison, Arkansas and passed away at Ontario on Tuesday, May 19th. She leaves her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Otis Nichols of Rockville and three sisters, Mrs. Verla Green, Irene and Lucille; and five brothers, Olen, Norman, Floyd, J. R. and Clyde.

Funeral services were held from the Community church Thursday with the Rev. Floyd White in charge of the services. The Eagles assisted in making arrangements for the funeral. Music was furnished by Mrs. J. W. Poage and Mrs. Al Thompson, accompanied by Mrs. Floyd White at the piano. Interment was in the local cemetery.

Bonus Bonds To Be Mailed June 15

World War Veterans of Nyssa, along with those all over the United States are looking forward to their adjusted service certificate payment, commonly known as the "bonus," which is to be paid soon. The payments are being made through the various Federal Reserve Bank Districts, and this district is served by the bank at San Francisco.

Under the present plan, \$50 bonds registered in the veteran's name and non-negotiable, will be mailed out from San Francisco on June 15th, with any odd balance to be paid in cash. For example if the veteran has a payment of \$645 coming, he will receive 12 bonds of \$50 each, carrying 3 per cent interest; and cash for the odd balance of \$45. He can either keep the bonds as an investment or cash them at the post-office for their face value.

This added money going into circulation in June is expected to boom business and many veterans will be able to pay off old indebtedness, buy new merchandise, start buying a home and in various other ways keep the wheels of commerce moving.

In Nyssa this means approximately \$50,000 will be paid veterans and some \$122,000 will be distributed in Malheur County. The amount to be paid in the state of Oregon is nearly 23 million dollars.

Frank T. Morgan of Nyssa will preside at the meeting, which will include the formation of a Malheur county chapter of the Oregon Republican Club. Capt. Dancy has spoken before many groups during his tour of Oregon and has always proven himself an entertaining and instructive speaker.

The Townsend Club is planning an auction sale for Saturday, May 23rd in Nyssa and are planning on making it a real event. Col. Bert Anderson, auctioneer from Ontario will cry the sale.

The club plans to have a large assortment of furniture, farm machinery, tools, produce, food stuffs, livestock and other valuable articles. Many of these articles are being donated, at least in part, toward helping the Townsend movement along.

The sale will be held in town on the vacant lots between the Owyhee Irrigation office and the Smoke Shop. The ladies of the club are planning to serve a lunch on that day and will also give away a quilt.

Interest in the affair has become widespread, and a large crowd is expected. Similar auctions have been held at Vale and Payette and both proved to be successful sales.

POPPY DAY TO BE HELD SATURDAY BY THE AUXILIARY

Saturday, May 23 will be Poppy Day in Nyssa and throughout the United States. Millions of Americans will observe the day by wearing memorial poppies in honor of the World War dead. Nearly one hundred thousand women from the American Legion Auxiliary will distribute the flowers and receive contributions for the welfare of the disabled veterans and families of the dead and disabled.

Observance of Poppy Day here will be in charge of Nyssa Unit of the Auxiliary, with Mrs. Wesley Browne as general chairman. A large corps of volunteer workers from the Unit and Girl Scouts is ready to begin distribution of the flowers on the downtown streets early Saturday morning. By evening Auxiliary leaders hope to have practically everyone in the city wearing a poppy and to have raised funds which will assure continuance of the Unit's welfare activities during the coming year.

Auxiliary workers will wear distinctive badges and all will serve as volunteers without compensation of any kind. No price will be asked for the poppies but each person allowed to contribute as much or as little as he feels able. All contributions will go to the support of the Legion and Auxiliary welfare programs, with bulk of the money remaining in the hands of the Unit for local work.

The poppies to be distributed here Saturday have been made by disabled veterans at the Roseburg Hospital, one of the sixty centers where the flowers have been manufactured this year under the direction of the Auxiliary. Employment has been given to hundreds of disabled men receiving little or no government compensation and who could not possibly have done other work. More than ten million poppies have been made for Saturdays observance.

EAGLES RODEO TO BE HELD AUGUST 15-16

The Nyssa Eagles are planning to hold their third annual Rodeo this year on the 15th and 16th of August. Lloyd Marshall is again general chairman of the show and committees were appointed Wednesday night to handle the various details. FRESH PEA CROP LOOKS VERY GOOD

Growers are jubilant over the prospects of one of the finest crops of green peas in the history of the Nyssa country, with the weather being ideal for a good crop. The peas look excellent, have set on well and both growers and dealers feel that this years crop will be one of the best.

The crop is earlier this year than last and the harvest will start sometime between the 1st of June and the 10th. This will give work to quite a crew of pea pickers and with the heavy crop on the vines, it is believed pickers will be able to make good wages this year.

GRAHAM, BURRELLE BEERS, DALEY WIN IN PRIMARY FRIDAY

A light vote was cast Friday in the Primary Election, with the largest vote cast for any office being that of County School Superintendent in which 2882 votes were cast. The race for circuit judge drew a total vote of 2833.

In the Republican race for the county judgeship nomination, David F. Graham, present judge, ran away from his opponents to receive a total of 760 with Fairman polling 554 and Deming 390. Judge Graham carried both North and South Nyssa precincts.

Judge Graham will be opposed in the general election by Theron R. Beers, Democratic candidate for judge, who won over Fred J. Clemo by a 592 to 408 count. Mr. Beers also carried both Nyssa precincts.

L. P. Peterson of Vale won the Republican nomination for Commissioner, his nearest opponent being W. S. Skinner of Jordan Valley, who was just 18 votes behind. Peterson received 575 votes, Skinner 557 and Frizell had 409. On the Democratic side of the fence, John Moleenaar won the nomination by polling 449 votes, with 435 for E. H. Brumbach, present incumbent; and Sam Corliss brought up the rear with 156 votes.

The Republican race for the clerk nomination, which developed into quite a battle between Roy Daley, present incumbent and Charles Howell, former deputy; was won by Daley by a count of 945 to 732.

Jean Burrelle, deputy in the assessor's office had but little trouble in getting the Republican nomination for Assessor. She polled 634 votes as against 406 for Overstreet, 360 for Bennett and 228 for Coats. Murray Morton, incumbent, won the Democratic nomination over Looney, 736 to 250.

Mrs. Ora Hope, present county treasurer defeated Walter Marshall for the Republican nomination by a count of 992 to 575. There was no one filed for the Democratic nomination for Treasurer.

In the race for the Republican nomination for representative, Virgil Staples, present incumbent, defeated Carl Coad by a count of 1120 to 418. Staples will be opposed in the general election by Orrin Currey, who received the Democratic nomination unopposed.

Robert M. Duncan won the Republican nomination for State Senator over Eugene Pratt of Adrian. The vote in Malheur county was fairly close, being 806 for Duncan and 679 for Pratt. In Grant county Pratt was overwhelmed by a vote of 799 to 290. Duncan will be opposed in the general election by Robt. E. Lees, who was unopposed for the Democratic nomination.

Judge Chas. Ellis won his race with M. A. Biggs with a neat majority. In Malheur county the count was 1117 for Biggs and 1716 for Ellis while in Grant county it was 741 for Biggs and 1217 for Ellis. Ellis also received a good majority in Harney county.

While Albert Hopkins polled the most votes in the three-cornered race for county superintendent, he did not get a majority over the other two, so it means that Hopkins and Kathryn Claypool, present incumbent, will both be on the ballot in the general election. The vote for Hopkins was 1310 as against 1044 for Claypool and 528 for Mrs. E. M. Crall.

The office of sheriff was unopposed, A. V. Cook of Nyssa getting the Republican nomination with 1034 votes and Sheriff Charles Glenn receiving the Democratic nomination with 1019 votes. J. Edwin Johnson was unopposed for surveyor and (Continued on page 8)
